### Prosperity.

John Donoghue, a Chicago sculptor,  
committed suicide to escape starvation,  
says the Daily American of that city.  
Thus does capitalism reward genius!  
There would be no incentive under So-  
cialism for a man to do anything—like  
that. Each could easily procure, by a  
little work, all the needs, or even luxu-  
ries, of life. You helped to murder  
that artist by voting for the present  
competitive hell.

Here's another from the same source:  
Dr. Louis Shaw, of Chicago, committed  
suicide because his fortune was swept  
away in the panic of last month. Great  
system, eh?

Here's another from New York: Sa-  
rah Solomon, aged 13 years, working  
sixteen hours a day for a few dollars to  
help keep the family from starving, the  
father being out of work, killed herself  
by drinking carbolic acid. Great and  
glorious country! Wise and honest law  
makers! Christian citizenship! What  
are the churches doing that they look  
with complacency on the murder of chil-  
dren, while taking pew rent from the  
capitalists who do the murdering?

And here is another: Mrs. Karp, of  
Chicago, aged 60, after working forty  
years on an average of eighteen hours a  
day, with no chance of anything differ-  
ent, took poison to get out of the misery  
of this capitalistic world. She left a  
note in which she said, "Good-bye.  
Do not think that I do not love you and  
my children; but for forty years I have  
drudged day after day in the kitchen  
until my strength failed me. I see no  
hope of rest, except in the cemetery  
lot." This is a worse fate than any  
slave ever lived. They had an occasion-  
al holiday—she never had. She is the  
kind the president wants to replenish  
the working class, so that the capitalists  
will have a full supply of slaves for the  
next generation. Hers is the fate of  
millions of working women. Such a  
damnable civilization should not be re-  
formed—it should be wiped out, and a  
decent one put in its place. This world  
will be hell for the working class so long  
as the capitalists control the politics,  
and fasten their infernal laws over the  
people, holding them while they are  
robbed by the rich men's trusts, com-  
bines and profit mills. Are you ready  
for the change? Have you not had  
enough of this?

The New York Journal says: With-  
out a friend in the world or a penny in  
his pocket, "Whitey," a 16-year old  
newsboy, committed suicide by jumping  
into the East river at pier 22. To his  
fellow newsboys he had declared that  
he was tired of the struggle for exist-  
ence, and that he intended giving up  
the seemingly hopeless fight.

A nation that is organized on a basis  
that makes suicides of school boys be-  
cause they cannot get enough to live on,  
but slowly starve, is certainly damna-  
ble enough to change, don't you think?  
The republicans and democrats have  
been running this country for the last  
century—have n't they had time enough  
to make conditions suitable to live un-  
der? You, reader, if you vote for these  
parties, which means a continuance of  
this thing, are just as much guilty of  
that murder as if you had thrown the  
boy overboard. Under Socialism the  
boys and girls will be sent to school;  
they will be provided at the cost of  
the nation with the best of clothing,

the best of food, the best of homes,  
the best of instruction and entertain-  
ment. Do you think they would com-  
mit suicide then? When they grew up  
to the working age—about 21—they  
would repay this by having taken from  
their labor enough to do the same thing  
for the babies growing up; and thus  
they would repay what they had con-  
sumed in their bringing up. Which  
system would be best? It is up to you.  
Will you vote for Socialism?

A hundred more cases as heart-rend-  
ing as the above could be quoted from  
the daily press, but would they arouse  
your intelligence and make you wish to  
change the system you have been edu-  
cated to bear?—*Appeal to Reason.*

### The Robbery on Oil.

The Kansas oil fields are producing  
2,000,000 barrels a year. The Stand-  
ard Oil Co. gets the entire product at  
75 cents a barrel and sells it at \$7.50 a  
barrel, less the trifling expense of about  
a dollar a barrel for refining. Thus  
did Providence thousands of years ago  
look forward to the coming of Rocke-  
feller, and provided him with an income  
of \$10,000,000 a year from the labor  
of people in Kansas! The people who  
are employed by Rockefeller are in  
number not one-hundredth of the peo-  
ple who are employed in getting the oil  
out of the earth, but his crowd gets  
nine-tenths of the products. Will the  
people never wake up to the bunco game  
being played on them? Nature placed  
the oil in the earth for the human fam-  
ily, and the human family should have  
it for the exact labor it takes to get it  
and prepare it for use. This would en-  
rich every citizen. Say, why should  
the whole people pay a few for the use  
of nature's products? The robbery on  
oil has been the base of the greatest for-  
tunes and the creation of the meanest  
monopolies. The people should take  
the oil and refine it for their own use.  
What is the government for if it does  
nothing for the people who support it?

### Private Capital The Curse.

Speaking of the awful corruption  
that exists in the public service every-  
where, of the selling of laws to oppress

the bribery of commercial life by the

will oppress the many and corrupt every-  
thing between them and the power to

in a thousand knows what the word  
means. McClure's Magazine will not  
teach anything that will help the peo-  
ple re-possess themselves of the wealth that

### A Compulsory Gift.

The underpaid and poverty-stricken  
workers in the Pennsylvania iron indus-  
try have just given \$2,500,000 to Dum-  
ferline, Scotland. The gift was made  
at the hands of Mr. Carnegie. What an  
unselfish act—the giving of millions by  
starving, under-fed and under-clothed  
American workmen to a city in Scot-  
land! That is charity for you! Will  
the American working class see the  
point? Or are they too dulled in brain  
by overwork and lack of decent sur-  
roundings to know they have made this  
gift? If they were awake, they cer-  
tainly would vote the Socialist ticket,  
and then this princely gift in United  
States steel bonds, giving the city \$100,-  
000 a year income out of their hide-  
and-tallow, would soon be as worthless
