McKenzie, of railroad fame, Mr. J. F. Junkin, president of the Manufacturers' Life Assurance Company, and Col. Sam Hughes, M. P. Further details of the doings of the "Old Boys" will be given in future communications. No doubt a trip to the old County will be a seasoning in this season's revelry.
