### A Government Hotel.

Canadian Commercial Agent Ross, writing from Perth, West Australia, says:

"It remained for the Government of West Australia to demonstrate that the State can successfully run an up-to-date hotel as a model. The experiment was made by it in a locality where a great deal of sly grog selling was going on among the miners. In the Government hotel you can buy liquors, beers, cigars etc. at regulation rates, and during regulation hours. But there is no selling on Sunday or to men already tipsy. The house will show a profit of \$5,000 this year, and opens up a new line for Socialistic legislation."

That is the way all hotels ought to be run, and will be in the coming days of Socialism. The liquor traffic would be shorn of at least half its evils if only the Government—that is, the whole people—made a profit out of it; as there would then be no inducement to adulterate liquor, or to sell it to minors or to men who could not or would not drink in moderation. We have always been in favor of Prohibition; and, failing that, would like to see all hotels run by the Government. Many years ago a hotel keeper in this village said, "My business is to sell to any person who can drink it, or down whose throat it can be poured, as long as he or anybody else will pay for it;" and hundreds of other liquor vendors will do the same thing, though they may not be so outspoken. If the profit of the traffic and the custom of treating could be done away with, there would not be one half—perhaps not one quarter—the drunkenness there now is.

### Dickson's Hall.

Since the beginning of last week Mr. Thomas Littleton has been at work on Dickson's hall, making improvements which will cost a good bit of money. The stage has been enlarged by the removal of the small dressing-rooms behind it, and now measures 20x30 feet; and two dressing rooms, each about 14x18 feet, have been built in the basement. The two big stoves and the closets containing them, at the front of the hall, will be done away with, and it will be heated by a furnace, which Mr. Heard ordered when in Toronto this week. Some changes are to be made in the arrangement of the seats, an expert is coming to build a cement chimney right up from the foundation, and a flight of stairs in each of the back corners of the stage will give access to the dressing rooms below. The hall measures 32x60 feet, and, when all the improvements are finished, will be the best the village has ever had, especially for theatrical representations; and, unless we are very much mistaken, Mr. Dickson will find that the money he is spending on it will bring a great deal more than the current rate of interest. The stage is now nearly three times as large as the one in the plan of the public hall that was voted down a few years ago; but it is none too big.
