### DEMANDS AN INQUIRY.

Governor of East Africa Protectorate Objects to Jewish Colony.

Mombasa, British East African Protectorate, June 22.—Sir Charles H. E. Elliot, British commissioner and commander-in-chief for the East African Protectorate, has resigned the commissionership because he is opposed to the proposed Jewish settlement in the East African Protectorate.

Sir Charles has cabled to Premier Balfour demanding a public enquiry of the circumstances of his resignation and adding:

"Lord Lansdowne ordered me to refuse grants of land to private individuals while giving enormous tracts in East Africa to a syndicate. I have refused to execute these instructions, which I consider unjust and impolitic."

The East African syndicate represents the Jewish Colonial Trust.

### Canada Won.

London, June 22.—(C. A. P.)—At the Crystal Palace the Canadian bowlers defeated a strong side of the London County Club, led by Dr. W. G. Grace. The Dominion bowlers displayed the best form they have yet shown while on tour, winning in brilliant style by 85 to 79. On Saturday the Canadians play an international game against Wales at Cardiff.

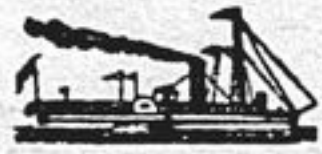

### NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.
2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.
3. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.
4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is *prima facie* evidence of intentional fraud.
