KILL 1,000 ACHINESE.

Many Women and Children Slain By Dutch Troops in East Indies.

Amsterdam, July 6.—A despatch from Batavia, capital of the Dutch East Indies, says that the commander of the expedition to North Achin, northern Sumatra, attacked Likat on June 20. The Achinese losses were 132 killed, including 281 women and children, and 54 wounded; 17 prisoners were taken.

The Dutch casualties included the commander, a lieutenant, two sergeants and 13 soldiers wounded.

On June 23 the Dutch troops attacked Tangat Bars when the Achinese losses were 654 killed, including 188 women and 180 children and 49 wounded. Twenty-eight prisoners were taken.

The Dutch losses were a captain, 122 soldiers and six coolies wounded.

Government After C. A. R.

Montreal, July 6.—A special from Ottawa to La Patrie says: "You can state without fear of contradiction that the Government is negotiating with Mr. Booth for the purchase of the Canada Atlantic, the price being twenty million dollars. The road will then be leased by the Canadian Northern. I am told that although an Order-in-Council will be adopted, the measure will not be submitted to the House this session."

Engineer Is Chosen.

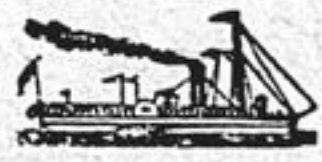

Jamieson, the Canadian grain elevator engineer, to prepare plans and specifications for a large fireproof grain elevator to be built at Port Colborne, the Lake Erie entrance to the Welland Canal, and which will be an adjunct to the canal system.

POST-OFFICE—F. J. KERR, POSTMASTER. Open daily, Sundays excepted, from 7.30 a. m. to 7 p. m. Mail going south closes at 7 p. m. Letters for registration must be posted half an hour previous to the time for closing the mails.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.
2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.
3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.
4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
