HALF FARE.—Str. *Manita* will issue return tickets from all points to Lindsay at half regular return fare to-day, July 15th, circus day in Lindsay. Good only for return same day.

BRICKS.—On Monday the steamer *Maple Leaf* arrived at the Falls with a scow-load of 45 000 red bricks, some of which were for the Methodist parsonage, some for Mr. Henry Brooks, some for Mr. Jas. Akister, of Verulam, and some for Mr. Fletcher Mitchell, of the same township. The bricks, which were drawn away on Wednesday, were made by Mr. Fox and appeared to be of excellent quality, cost \$8 50 per thousand delivered here, which is a reasonable price, considering the great demand for them that there is just at present.

THE CROPS.—From all quarters—north, south, east and west—come good accounts of the crops, with the exception of mangelweds and turnips, which on some farms had to be sown a second time. All kinds of grain are looking well, and the crop of hay, especially clover, is "simply immense." though, so far, some of it has been injured by getting wet after it was cut. As usual, there are a few farmers who find something to grumble at, but nineteen out of every twenty of them admit that this year's harvest will be an exceptionally good one.

THE GLORIOUS TWELFTH.—The morning of Tuesday last the 12th of July was so wet that the outlook for the Orangemen was exceedingly gloomy, but at about 11 o'clock the rain ceased and the sky cleared, and the afternoon was all that could be wished. Some twenty-five or thirty lodges of Orange men and True Blues assembled at Kinmount, where this year's celebration was held, and the proceedings were the same as they always have been and always will be so long as they shall be held. Col. Hughes was not present, but Mr. Carnegie was, and delivered one of the five or six addresses to which the brethren listened with their usual wrapt attention.

THE REEVE'S NEW STORE.—From various causes, the men employed on Reeve McFarland's new store have not made much headway during the last few days, but the cellar walls, which are of solid concrete and a foot thick, are now finished, and the laying of the hollow blocks—the making of which has been steadily progressing in the curling rink—will, it is expected, be commenced early next week. The roof, which is to slope about an inch to the foot, from the front to the rear, will be covered with one of the patent feltings used for that purpose, and the building will be so nearly fireproof that the insurance upon it and its contents will not be much, if any, more than half what Mr. McFarland is now paying. The cellar is to have a cement floor, which will be impervious to water; but it cannot be laid until the walls shall be up and the roof on.

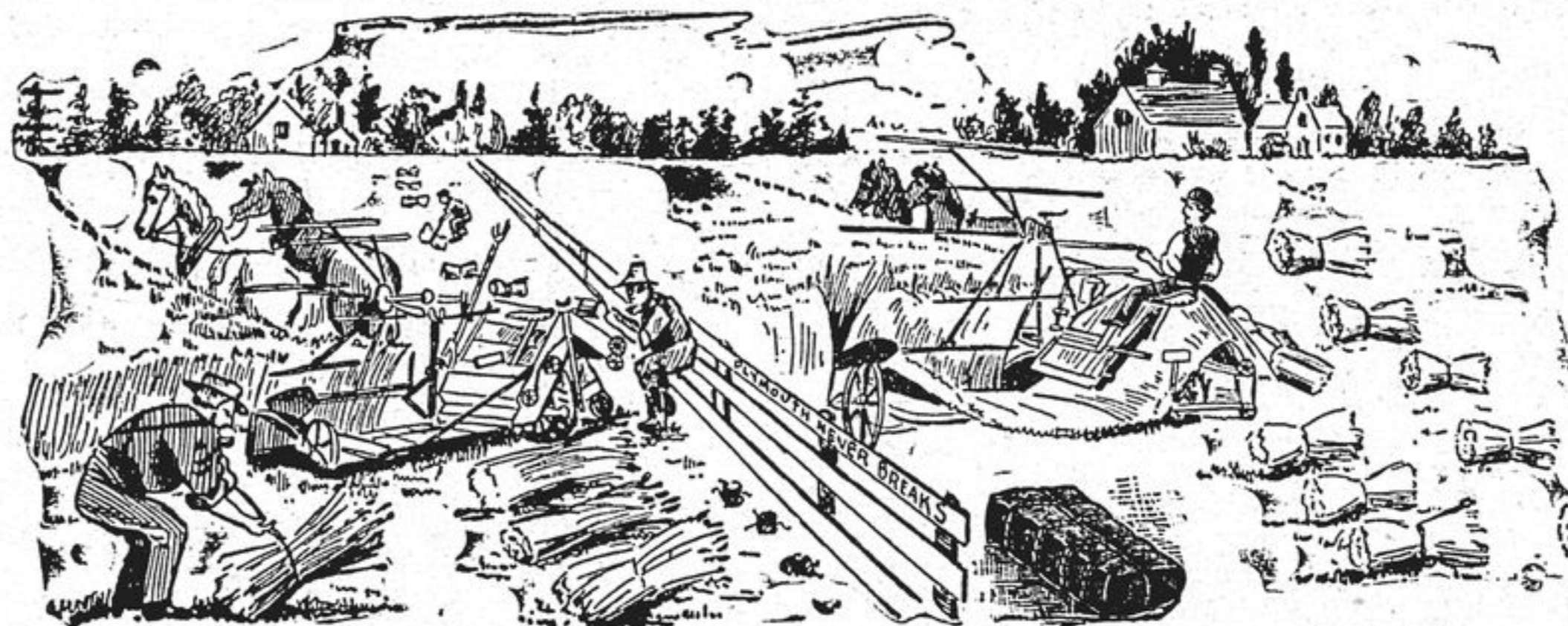
