THE BISLEY SHOOTING.

In Spite of Adverse Winds Canadians Made Some Good Scores.

Bisley Camp, July 13.—(C. A. P.)—Strong winds yesterday adversely affected scoring but notwithstanding some good cards were returned by Canadians.

Firing for the Alexander Martin match rifle yesterday, Sergt. G. Mortimer of the 10th Royal Grenadiers scored 47 out of a possible 50 at 900 yards.

In the Armourers Company competition, ten shots at 900 yards, Major W. F. Moore of the 20th Regiment, Georgetown, made 47 and Pte. Neil Smith of the 21st Regiment 46 out of a possible 50.

Pte. Neil Smith also shot in the "Skilled Shots" competition, making 34 out of a possible 35 on the "hour glass" series, seven shots at 600 yards.

Pte. Tyers of the 10th Toronto Regiment in the "Hour Glass" series scored 33.

Sergt. G. Mortimer of the same regiment, firing in the "Ladies" competition, ten shots at 1,000 yards, made 33. For the "J. H. Steward" silver challenge cup, seven shots at 600 yards, his card showed 34.

In the "Gregory" competition, seven shots at 200 yards, Color-Sergt. A. G. Gardner of the 63rd Sherbrooke Regiment scored 34, and Staff-Sergt. Bayles, 10th Royal Grenadiers, a possible.

Color-Sergt. W. H. Youhill, 90th Regiment, Winnipeg, in the service rifle "Association Cup" series, seven shots at each of 200 and 600 yards, scored 33 at the shorter distance and 34 at the other. Staff-Sergt. Crowe totalled 45.

Staff-Sergt. Bayles made another possible in the "Skilled Shots" series.

Diaz Still President.

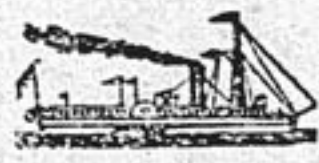

Strong Hind Legs and Feet.

The hind legs should be well set, straight, short and thoroughly supported below the hocks. Too much stress cannot be laid on the conformation of the hind legs and feet, says W. J. Kennedy, an Iowa breeder. Here is one of the very weakest points in our fat hog. Many hogs have excellent form, but poor feet and legs, thus are compelled to go lugging on the market as cripples. The legs should be short, pasterns short and strong, and the hog should walk on his toes, not on his dewclaws.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
