The boat will leave the wharf at 7:30; tickets, 25 and 15 cents.

**LAYING THE BLOCKS**—The work of laying the cement blocks upon the foundation walls of Mr. McFarland's new store was commenced on Tuesday last by Mr. John Dobson, of Verulam, who, though in his 74th year, is what the Yankees would call as "spry and active" as many a man not more than half his age. 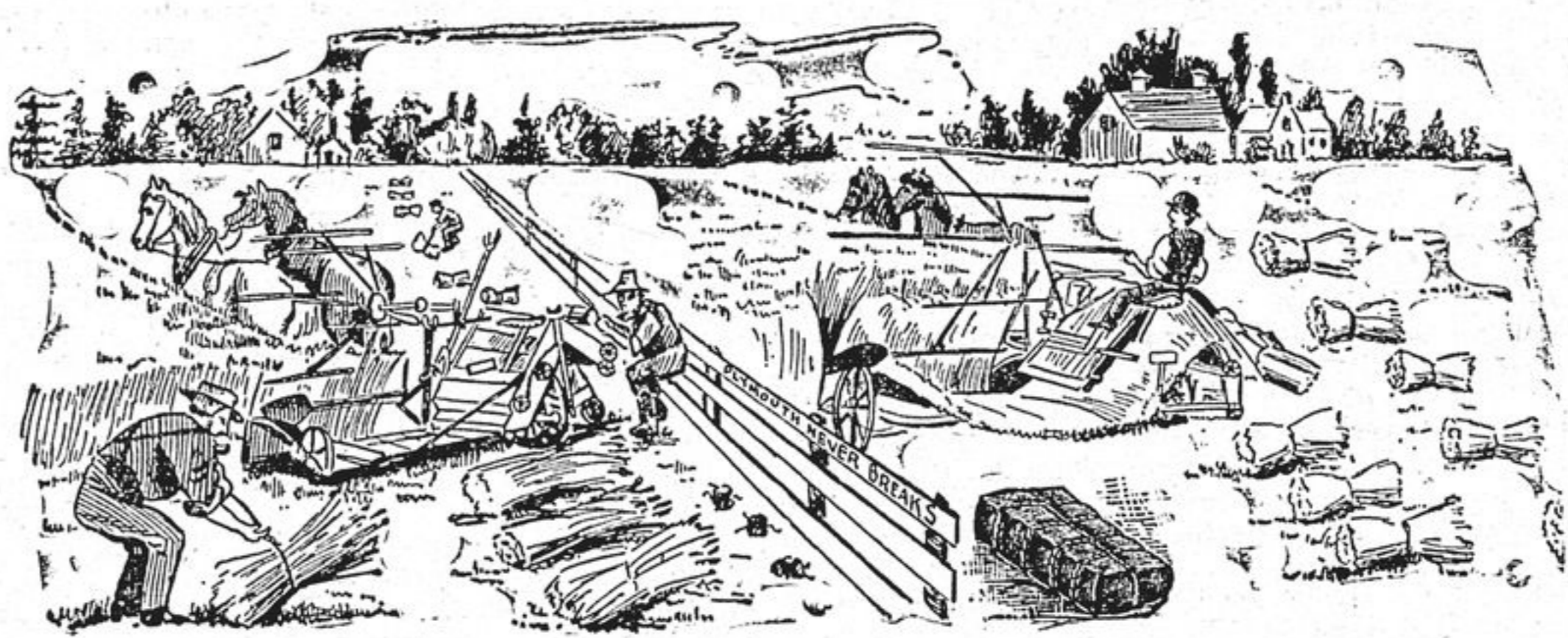
