CYCLONE IN ESSEX.

Houses and Barns Unroofed and Barns Struck By Lightning.

Walkerville, July 20.—A cyclone swept over the county between Wolf's Hotel and Walkerville Monday afternoon. Trees were uprooted and broken and barns demolished. The barn of Joseph Balliergeon, a Sandwich East farmer, was struck by lightning. The structure burned, entailing a loss of \$400.

The house of Ernest Langlois, another farmer, was unroofed by the storm, but fortunately the inmates escaped harm. Four Windsor young men who were in the boathouse owned by Alexander St. Louis, on the river front, had a thrilling time. The storm ripped the boathouse to pieces. The party was blown into the river, where they remained throughout the hailstorm.

Tokio, July 20.—The armored cruisers Rossia, Rurik and Gromobol of the Russian Vladivostok squadron, passed through the Tauraru Strait into the Pacific Ocean to-day.

STRATHCONA REPORTS.

Good Opening in Great Britain For Canned Eggs.

London, July 20.—The annual report of Lord Strathcona has been received, and will form the weekly report of the Department of Trade and Commerce for Aug. 8. The High Commissioner forwards extracts from the returns of the British Board of Trade which indicate a very gratifying development in Canadian trade. Speaking of the butter trade, the High Commissioner says that it is generally conceded that the standard and quality of Canadian butter have been improved and the refrigerator service has likewise been found of a more satisfactory character. There is an increasing demand for apples.

The High Commissioner reports there is a good opening for canned eggs in gallon tins, for which the baking and confectionery trade are waiting. Quite a trade, which is capable of great development, has sprung up during the last year in bottled fruits. The report also speaks very highly of the samples of Canadian tobacco which have been sent over and examined by experts in London, who made a decidedly favorable report.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper from the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.

2. If any person returns his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

4. If a subscriber returns his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it from the post-office. This procedure upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them unsealed for, is *prima facie* evidence of intentional fraud.
