British Government Acts.

London, July 27.-The British Government is taking energetic action in the case of the sinking of the British steamer Knight Commander by the Vladivostock squadron. All information received by the Government tends to establish in the official mind that an outrage has been committed for which no excuse exists in international law. Those aware of the feelings of the ministry said last night that all the members of the Cabinet are in accord regarding the principle of the inviolability of innocent neutral shipping, as well as I pon the principle that a neutral ship cannot be destroyed even if carrying contraband of war.

Will Include Compensation.

The demands which will be made upon the Russian Government will include compensation to the owners of the ship and to the owners of the goods on board the Knight Commander, an apology for the action of the Russian cruisers and an agreement that instructions be given which will prevent a repetition of such action. British ship-owners are up in arms over the dangers which shipping is now running, and are bombarding the Government with representations looking to the thorough protection of their interests.

Papers Grow Angry.

A majority of the morning papers, however, print edi rials in an angry strain on the further reported seizures by the Russians and the delay in the release of the Malacca.

The Daily Mail's Suez correspondent says that the steamer Formosa will be released this morning.

It is rumored that Japanese warships have arrived in the Red Sea.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment. 2. If any person orders his paper discon-

tinued he must pay all arrearges, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made. 3. Any person who takes a paper from

the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay. 4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound

to pay for if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses. 5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from

the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
