RUMORS OF LAND BATTLE.

Defeat of Paraguay Government Troops, But No Confirmation.

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 24.—There are persistent rumors that a land engagement has been fought between the Paraguayan revolutionists and the Government troops, resulting in the defeat of the latter and the capture of 400 men.

The rumors cannot be confirmed. There is no definite news regarding the progress of the revolution.

Attempted Suicide.

Hamilton, Aug. 24.—Last evening an unfortunate young woman about 24 years of age was found just inside the gates of Dundurn Park. P. C. Reynolds stumbled across her about 10 o'clock. He tried to rouse her, but without success. When he tried to lift her up off the bench and stand her on her feet a bottle labeled "Opium" fell on the ground. No one appears to know her name. The only clue the police have is a handkerchief bearing the initials "H. I." At midnight the whole staff of doctors at the hospital were working over her, but did not succeed in bringing her around so that she could tell her name.

Canada and Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 24.—Bitter feeling has been aroused here over the action of Canada in deciding to establish a custom house in Hamilton Inlet, Labrador, which Newfoundland claims as her territory, by reason of her occupation of it for the past 100 years, though Canada, in recent years, has advanced a claim to the region. The Government is being urged to prevent the erection of the station, and it will protest strongly to the British Government against the alleged encroachment.

Killed By Runaway.

Drayton, Aug. 24.—On Saturday Jas. Forest of the second of Maryboro was driving his team through his farm gate when they ran away east to the village of Glenallen, striking a retired farmer, Charles Crapp, in the back, breaking his ribs and otherwise injuring him so badly that he died yesterday.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.
2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.
3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.
4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is *prima facie* evidence of intentional fraud.
