NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment. 2 If any person orders are paper discon-

tinued he must pay all arrearges, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is mad , and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not There can be no legal discontinuance with the payment is made. 3. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has sub-

scribed or not, is responsible for the pay. 4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses

5. The courts have decid d that refusing to take newspapers and period cals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud,
