

**THE ROSS HOSPITAL.**—The revised scale of charges of the Ross Memorial Hospital, Lindsay, which went into effect on March 1st, is as follows: In public wards, 50c. per day, weekly in advance. In semi-private wards, \$1.00 per day, weekly in advance. In private wards, \$1.75 per day, weekly in advance. Operating room; major operations \$5.00, minor operations \$2.00. Ambulance; within the town of Lindsay, \$1.00 per trip; from places outside the town of Lindsay as may be arranged. Wine and spirits supplied to patients will be charged for in addition to maintenance.

**FLOODS.**—In many places the people—or some of them—are being troubled by floods caused by the sudden melting of the great quantity of snow that was upon the ground a few days ago. Here at the Falls comparatively little annoyance is caused by floods; but along the south side of Francis street west is a small creek which for a few days every spring swells into a river deep and rapid enough to endanger the life of any child four or five years old that chanced to fall into it. Just at present it is rushing right merrily past the Gazette office, and a few rods further west, the sidewalk and the fronts of two or three lots are covered with water to such a depth that the occupants of the houses on the lots have to go to and from home the back way and cross their neighbors' premises. May street, which runs south from Francis street, is entirely under water for the greater part of its length, and so is part of the sidewalk on the east side of it. Three or four cellars are partly, and one is entirely, filled with water, but the trouble won't last long—and it's a certain indication that spring is here.

Prospects are for an early opening of navigation on the great lakes.

Two thousand British immigrants have arrived in Toronto during the past ten days.

Water is to be taken from Canada for an irrigation scheme in the State of Montana.

The British ship Eskasoni, which left Portland, Oregon, on April 15th, for Liverpool, is missing.

Gessler Ro sea was found guilty at New York of having sent an infernal machine to the Cunard steamer Umbria.

Allan Loney was acquitted at Cornwall of manslaughter in connection with the killing of Alcide Laurin at a hockey match.

Hon. Mr. Hanna announced in the legislature that the Government intended to introduce, this session, "some minor amendments" to the liquor license act.

Jaob Rupp, of Forest, was swept off a bridge into the Aux Sable River by flood. His horse was drowned, but he was rescued after being three hours in the water.

Cohen, a rich manufacturer in New York, cut the wages of the children from \$3.00 to \$2.50 a week, and they struck. He had them arrested for urging other children not to work.

Eleven men of a German detachment were killed and twenty-two wounded in a fight with natives in German Southwest Africa.
