

On Wednesday forenoon, and there is a strong suspicion that he was poisoned. He was fed at ten o'clock, when he seemed all right, but an hour later he lay down in a natural position, in the middle of the road, and remained there so long that somebody went to see if anything was the matter with him, and found that he was dead. It is said that no fewer than seventeen dogs—the great majority of them owned by persons who live on Fidler's hill—have been poisoned within the past few months, yet not one of the owners, many of whom we see every day, said a word to us about it. Of course it never occurred to us to stop any of them on the street and say: "You haven't had a dog poisoned lately—have you?"

NAVIGATION OPEN.—The first boat to arrive at the Falls this season was the *Marie Louise*, which came on Friday; the *Kathleen* was here on Saturday, and the *Alexandra* passed through the locks on Saturday, and again this (Wednesday) morning. The *Kathleen* is advertised in the *Post* to run every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday between Lindsay, Sturgeon Point and the Falls; and, by an advertisement in this issue of the *Gazette*, it will be seen that the Trent Valley Navigation Company's steamer *Manita* is now running regular daily trips between Bobcaygeon, Sturgeon Point and Lindsay, which will be continued until the end of this month, when other arrangements will probably be made. Mr. Burgoyne's *Kawartha* was out two or three times and around Cameron lake, and Mr. Robson's *Duuntless*, which is now being painted, will be out in a few days.

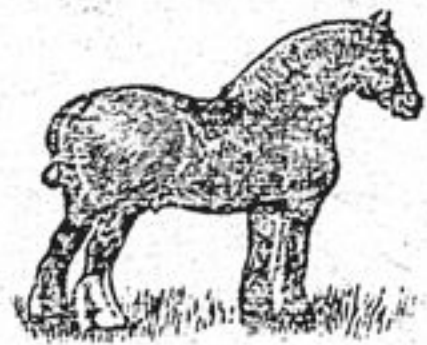
