Mr. Austin's was up-to-date long ago, and now Mr. Ouelette has made a spurt which has already been noticed in two papers, the reporters for which were in such a desperate hurry to give an item of news that they couldn't wait until Mr. Ouelette had finished his improvements, which are numerous and cost quite a bit of money. The walls and ceiling have been covered with a kind of oilcloth of very pretty pattern; there is a new counter, painted, like the meat racks, a dark red; there is a patent machine that grinds out little statement papers (with printed headings) on which to jot down the weight and price of joints etc. bought on credit, and sent out with them for the information of the purchasers; and last, though not least, there is a mammoth and magnificent refrigerator, which was made by the Eureka Co. of Toronto and cost nearly \$200. The front is of polished ash, and has plate glass windows that slide up and down, and at one end is a dark closet which will hold we don't know how much meat. Dark closets, be it observed, are used for very different purposes. 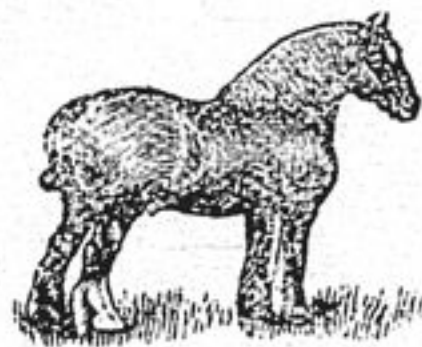
