A Fatal Blow to Russia.

The long-expected sea fight between Russia and Japan took place on Saturday and Sunday in the Straits of Corea, and resulted in so decisive a victory for the "little brown men" that it will probably end the war, as Russia appears to have no choice but to make peace upon such terms as her conqueror may dictate. While Japan lost no ships of any importance in the terrible engagement, ten out of Russia's fourteen most powerful battleships and cruisers were sunk and the other four captured, and Admiral Rozhkovsky, who was severely wounded during the fight, was taken prisoner after it was over. The Globe says, "In vessels, men and leaders the Baltic fleet has ceased to exist. Togo's victory is one of the most complete in the history of ocean warfare," and adds, "The czar has not yet dared to tell his people the whole truth. What will happen when they learn it?" It is said that the czar has expressed a determination to continue the hopeless struggle, but if he is crazy enough to do so he may lose his crown. Upon the seas upon the land, the Russians are no more a match for the Japanese than children are a match for grown men.

Drowning Accidents.

Every summer a deplorable number of drowning accidents happen, and already several have been recorded. The first, this season, in Toronto, occurred a few days ago, when two young men went out in a canvas canoe of their own make, which upset on its trial trip, and one of them was drowned. At St. Johns, Quebec, on Sunday last, a sail boat containing five men—neither of whom could swim or knew anything about sailing—was struck by a squall and upset, and three out of the five were drowned. The folly of people who cannot swim going out on the water in small boats has often been spoken of in print; but they will do it, and every year many of them lose their lives. And it is strange, but true, that thousands of girls who have not sufficient courage to face the mildest and most amiable mouse, are not afraid to go out, even on rough water, in a "trotterish" canoe or skiff that the least thing will upset. Captain Marryat said in one of his novels—"Newton Forster," we think it is—that "cowardice in a child is evidence of a superior intellect," or words to that effect, and we think he was right, and that the same may be said of grown-up persons, except that "cautiousness" would have been a better word to use than "cowardice." It is not courage that makes people risk their lives upon the water, but simply ignorance and thoughtlessness; and there is a verse in Scripture—though we forget the exact words—that says something about a fool going his way and being punished. We are, as one of the American humorists says, "several kinds of a fool," but we are not an aquatic fool, and seldom trust ourselves in anything much more easily reversed than a punt; and, therefore, we have never yet been drowned, and don't intend to be, if we can help it.

McFarland—Sims.—That F. McDougall's name be struck off the assessment roll for the Government Reserve, and that Robert Taylor's name be also struck off, and the name of R. J. Moore be placed there instead, and a business tax of \$250 be added. Also that Terrill Bros. be assessed as tenants of centre part of lot 2 south of F. and west of O., with business tax of \$630; and that J. J. Nevison, on part of lot 1 north of F. and west of O., be assessed for business tax of \$250.—Carried.

Sims—Littleton.—That any person, being a bona fide resident and ratepayer of this corporation, may be permitted to use the watering cart for private use, inside the corporation, on payment of fifty cents per day; the cart to be returned in good repair to the house on the market square every evening not later than 8 o'clock, and left filled with water. The chairman of the street and sidewalk committee to have control of the cart, and to see that all breakages made by the parties using it be made good at once.—Carried.
