Two or three carloads of furniture, chiefly for bedrooms, have already arrived, and more is coming almost every day, but it will take a very large quantity to equip all the numerous rooms in the house. On Wednesday Mr. Heard's staff were installing a large weighing 1,300 lbs. and a large "broiler," both made by George Sparrow & Co., of Toronto, and exactly the same as those in the King Edward Hotel, and on the same day the electric lighting connections were made. As stated last week, the Kawartha hotel will be opened on the 15th inst., and Mr. Brown, who is very much pleased with it, says that it will be one of the nicest summer resorts in Canada.

**TOO NEAR TOGETHER.**—The Irish comedy, "Maloney's Wedding Day," was given in Twomey's hall on Saturday night by a travelling company, and those who were present say that it was well rendered; but there was but a slim attendance, the hall being not more than half filled. The fact is, entertainments here have been rather too numerous—too near together—of late, and to go to all of them would cost more money than the great majority of our villagers feel disposed to spend on amusements. Bengough ought to have had far larger audiences than he was favored with, and we fully expected to hear that the hall was crowded on Saturday night, as anything funny is generally well patronized by young people. The only entertainment now advertised is to be given on the evening of Tuesday next, the 6th inst., by Miss Emma T. Irons, elocutionist, who, as she is coming under the auspices of L. O. L. No. 996, is likely to have a large audience, especially as she is to be assisted by local talent.
