

CHURCH PARADE.—The brethren of Treat Valley Lodge No. 71, C. O. O. F., will attend divine service in the Methodist church on Sunday morning, the 25th inst. In the afternoon the annual decoration ceremonies will take place at the cemetery.

Mr. Northey immediately sent for another, and we hope he may have better luck next time. On the following day the large pane of plate glass recently broken in Terrill Bros.' front was successfully replaced by a new one.

A SUCCESS.—The Presbyterian garden party at Mr. Wm. L. Robson's on Tuesday evening was a most gratifying success, there being so numerous attendance that the receipts amounted to nearly \$60. In addition to the villagers present, quite a crowd came from Lindsay on the *Esturion*, which, however, arrived so late its stay was shorter than it should have been. The spacious grounds, which are adorned with numerous beautiful trees, were illuminated by about fifty Chinese lanterns, and a splendid arc light was attached to a corner of the roof of the house, but was turned off while a number of fireworks were discharged. Various kinds of refreshments were provided, and were partaken of to the music of the village orchestra. On the veranda was a gramophone, which did its best to sound human; but we wondered, while we listened to it, whether any girl could force herself to marry a man with a voice (or a mouth) like that. As we heard two or three ladies remark, "Mr. Robson's is an ideal place for a garden party." It is far ahead of any other at the Falls, and we doubt whether it can be equalled in Lindsay.

RUNAWAY.—On Monday forenoon Mr. John Puley, of Fenelon, came to the Falls, accompanied by one of his sons, a boy about 14 years old, and on the way home, when opposite the old Naylor farm, just beyond the village boundary, one half of the team (a three-year-old colt that Mr. Puley bought last spring) took it into his head to run away, and persuaded the other half (a four-year-old mare) to run away too. They had gone but a very short distance when, from some cause, Mr. Puley was thrown from the wagon, and a little further on the box came off and the boy rolled out of it at the rear end. He escaped unhurt, but his father's head was so badly cut, high up on the left side, that Dr. Wilson had to put several stitches in the edges of the wound. When we saw Mr. Puley later in the day his head was bound up, and he was carrying a new open bridle, with a curb bit calculated to restrain the impetuosity of any horse, no matter how headstrong or jawstrong, that may wear it. He said that he took a great liking for the colt, which, though it had not figured as a prize taker, was "highly recommended" before he bought it, but that since then it had developed two or three eccentricities, the most objectionable of which was indulging in unexpected scoots. The runaways reached home without injury, except to their reputations.

Like An Irish Eviction.

Cologne, Germany, June 21.—A serious collision occurred Monday night between the police and the populace on Chlodwigs Platz. The police had received orders for the eviction of a tenant who was behind in the payment of rent for his house. Finally the police drew swords and dispersed the crowd, but not before the rioting had lasted six hours. About twenty persons were wounded.
