BALFOUR TAKES SERIOUS VIEW.

Sinking of St. Kilda to Be Fully Inquired Into.

London, June 21.—Premier Balfour, replying to a question in the House of Commons yesterday, said correspondence with the Russian Government was proceeding in regard to the sinking of the British steamer St. Kida. The Government took a very serious view of the matter because it had received the most specific assurances that no such action would again be taken, Russia Ignorant.

St. Petersburg, June 21.-Neither the Admiralty nor the Foreign Office are able to furnish any explanation of the sinking of the British steamer St. Kilda by the Russian auxiliary cruiser Daciper.

#### FROM STANLEY BARRACKS.

Two Hundred and Fifty Men For Gar-

rison Duty at Halifax. Ottawa, June 21 .- Two hundred and fifty infantry at Stanley Baracks have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to proceed to Halifax for garrison duty. Some 400 garrison artillery will also be sent from Quebec.

Fieldhouse Inquest.

Hamilton, June 21 .- The inquest on the death of Fred Fieldhouse, who was fatally injured in a street row last Friday night, was continued last night before Coroner McNichol. A great number of witnesses were called, but the enquiry was adjourned till this evening. The evidence last evening showed that the three prisoners-Mike Connors, James Neelon and Stanley Davis -were present during the row, but there was no conclusive evidence to show that any one of them had wielded the club on Fieldhouse.

Feeding Young Chicks.

E. G. Wyckoff, the celebrated white Leghorn breeder of New York, says: Chickens do not require any food the first 24 hours, but pure fresh water should be within their reach at all times, so arranged that they can drink without getting wet. The brooder floor can be covered with a thin layer of cut clover. A handful of bright chick grit or very stale bread slightly moistened with milk, can be given. The food of the chicks is practically the same as that furnished the adult stock, being prepared, of course, in a form suitable to their smaller size.

Chicks should be fed three or four times during the day, but care should be taken not to give them more than they will eat up quickly; in fact, food should not be before them more than five minutes at a time. Green food should be supplied regularly after they are a week or 'ten days old, and grit should be constantly before them. Granulated charcoal is a valuable corrective of digestive troubles, and should also be kept within easy access of the chicks until they are allowed free range. Brooders should be cleaned daily and a fresh litter or layer of cut clover with grit put on 'the floor.

Water Used by Plants.

Interesting work was done by the Wisconsin experiment station to determine how many pounds of water it required to produce a pound of dry matter in some of the leading crops. With barley it required over 400 pounds, oats slightly over 500 and corn about 300. To bring barley to maturity the station estimated that it required about thirteen inches of water as rainfall, oats about nineteen inches, corn about twenty-six inches. Although less water is required to manure a pound of corn, the greater tonnage to the acre requires the larger total.

### NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrearges, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made. 3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has sub-

scribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man

must pay for what he uses. 5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facis evidence of intentional fraud.
