The creek, though very shallow, flows over a deep bed of black muck, and a narrow three-inch plank lay across it. Early in the morning the two men went out of the house, and soon afterwards the elder walked towards the creek, leaving the other busy about the premises. A few minutes later Fred looked around for his father, and, to his dismay, saw him lying face downward in the creek, and, rushing to the spot, lifted him up and laid him upon his back; but Mr. Gaspell, his nearest neighbor, who arrived a minute or two later and knew the right thing to do, turned him over, and Mr. Fred Metcalfe, another neighbor, mounted his wheel and rode up town for a doctor. The old gentleman had slipped while crossing the plank, which was under his thighs; and the muck was so deep and soft that his arms went down in it almost to his shoulders and he could not help himself in the least. He was insensible when rescued, but had recovered sufficiently to stand up before the arrival of Dr. Graham, who said that if help had arrived a minute or two later than it did he would have been dead.
