suitable places for the lodgment of their seed -; but that they may be got rid of by applying a top dressing of well rotted manure to the poor spots on the lawn in the fall, and sowing them with fresh grass seeds in the spring, by which means the dandelions may be choked out of existence. The professor says "it is practically impossible to rid the G ground of them when there are so many going to seed all around, and thousands of seeds being carried hither and thither by the wind." That's so. There are tens of thousands of dandelions growing amidst the grass at the sides of our village streets, and there will be millions of them in two or three years if the cows, which now keep the majority of them eaten down, are no longer permitted to run at large.

GOOD ADVICE. - An exchange says : " Don't forget the editor when you have an item. If your wife whips you, let us know, and we will set it right before the public. If you have company, tell us, if you are not ashamed of your visitors. If a youngster arrives at your house and demands raiment, buy a quarter's worth of cigars and come around, and, if you are a cash subscriber, we will furnish a name for him or her, as circumstances warrant. If you have a social gathering of a few friends, bring around a big cake, six pies or a ham, not necessarily to eat, but as a guarantee of good saith. We mention these little things because we want the news." It is strange how oblivious the majority of people are, or appear to be, of the fact that the publisher of a paper is always hungry for items. We have friends and well wishers who will hear of something we would gladly publish, and will not say a word to us about it. If afterwards taxed with their remissness, they "ll generally say, "I thought you knew." Newspaper men can only acquire information, as other people do, through their eyes or ears; not through the peres of their skins, as some folks seem to think they can.

ROUGH ON THE PUBLIC -One of our exchanges says: " A recent regulation issued by the postal department is worth bearing in mind by those having boxes. As all postmasters are liable to make mistakes in putting mail matter into wrong boxes, this new regulation requires people to examine their mail matter before leaving the office; and should they find a piece not addressed to them, they must return it at once or be liable to a fine of \$200. That it is the fault of the post-master makes no difference." This new regulation will, if really enforced, be rather rough on the public; but "it's an ill wind that blows nobody any good," and it will be a boon to and rejoice the hearts of postoffice officials, who can now make more mistakes than ever, and with greater impunity, because the final responsibility for the correct distribution of the mails is shifted from their shoulders to those of the recipients. We had no idea that the post-office authorities could make a law and impose a penalty for its infraction; and is n't a five of \$200 rather steep for retaining, through another person's mistake, a paper worth only a couple of ents?
