#### Millions for a Few.

In New Ontario, 103 miles from North Bay, there has been discovered a silver deposit which it is thought may prove to be the richest in the world. The nearest place is called Cobalt, in which the first building was put up in November last, and very few more until June, when things took a sudden spurt, and there are by this time nearly a hundred—chiefly log huts and shacks of one kind or another. The plan of the town site, which was produced for the first time on the 28th ult., is now being surveyed into lots, and the work will be done and lots staked out in a couple of weeks. Great inconvenience has been caused by the delay of the Railway Commission to survey the town, but the owners of buildings previously erected will be given their lots at a fair valuation; but, as a matter of course, a few that have been inadvertently put upon streets will have to be removed. The value of the find may be inferred from the fact that on one property of eighty acres there is estimated to be two million dollars' worth of ore in sight, and that the total product of that single lot—which is only one of several owned by the same company—will probably be from fifty to one hundred millions. In an editorial the *Globe* says:

"In this connection arises again the inevitable question why something is not done for the Provincial Treasury what may fairly be called the share of the people in this great source of wealth. Immense fortunes will be made by a comparatively few persons, and no adequate return for this opportunity is made to the public to whom it has till now belonged. The time has obviously come to take administrative action of some sort. Failure to take it will be popular warrant for a verdict of incompetence against those who either fail to see the equity of the people's claim or refuse to take steps to make it good."

Of course there is a tremendous rush to the spot, and a few lucky individuals—those who have money and a "pull"—will become multi millionaires; but if the land on which the silver has been found belongs, as the *Globe* says it does, to "the public," we do not see why the public should not have the whole benefit of the discovery—less the cost of working the mines and turning the product into pure metal. But it may safely be predicted that nearly all of the newly-discovered wealth will go into the pockets of a few, and that the rest of its real owners, the public, will derive but little benefit from it; that is, with the exception of members of the legal fraternity, for, as the *Globe* says, "there has already sprung up an abundant crop of disputes, some of which may be settled in the Department of Lands and Mines, while others are sure to find their way into the courts."

#### Civic Holiday Celebration.

The civic holiday celebration on Wednesday was a complete success, and there were more people in town than there ever were before, except at 12th of July celebrations. The sports began at 10 a. m. on the canal and ended about 6 p. m. on the agricultural grounds. The callithumpian procession, which was held at 12.30 instead of at 9, and was the first of its kind ever attempted in town, comprised about 30 vehicles of various descriptions, and was altogether well done. Lack of space prevents a detailed account of the procession and the day's proceedings. The committee expect to hand over to the Library Board about \$130 as the result of the celebration. #### LIGHTNING'S WORK.

About 3 o'clock on Sunday morning, during the storm then raging, a large building, used as an implement shed, work-shop and store room, on Mr. Henry Eyres's farm, near Cameron, was struck by lightning, set on fire and totally destroyed, together with a buggy, a cutter, a cream separator, nearly a ton of binder twine he was selling on commission, and some other articles. As far as we can learn, there was no insurance. A horse and two colts, owned by three different persons near Cameron, were killed.

#### OUT OF DANGER.

We are pleased to be able to report that Mr. John Rutherford's little boy, who was so badly scalded on the 20th ult., is able to be up and out, and that his recovery is now considered certain. All the burns have healed except the worst, which is upon one of his shoulders, where there is still a sore spot. Dr. Graham thinks his face will not be disfigured, as it was not deeply burned; most of the almost boiling water having fallen on his shoulders and breast, to which it was held until his clothing was removed.

#### CORRECTION.

The assessment difficulty between the village and the Lindsay Light, Heat & Power Co., was not settled by arbitration, as stated in the *Gazette*, the *Star* and the *Post*, but by an appeal to the Board of County Judges. The referee asked us to make this correction, as the question of costs is involved, and we make it accordingly. The company appealed against their assessment at the Court of Revision, and, as no reduction was made, they then appealed to the Board of Judges, with the same result; indeed, one of the three thought the assessment too low, and would have raised it, but the other two decided to leave it as it was. The outcome of the fight is a feather in Assessor Graham's cap.
