

ACCIDENT AT FOOT-BALL.—Fias r Mann, about 12 years old, who lives with his grand mother, Mrs. McDiarmid, on Bond street west, had the large of the two bones below his right knee broken while playing at foot-ball on Fidler's hill a few days ago. Another boy, kicking at the ball, missed it, and his foot came into contact with Fraser's "fibia," (as the doctors call it,) which in snapping made a noise that was heard for a considerable distance; though we doubt that it was, as one of the players said, "as loud as the report of a pistol." Under Dr. Graham's care the patient is doing well, and the broken bone will soon be as strong as ever.

LONG OATS.—Just too late for notice in last week's issue, Mr. Kearns brought us three heads of oats which were grown on Mr. Richard Webster's farm near Balsam Grove, in Fenelon, and the longest of which—from the extremity of its "tap pickle" to the commencement of its stalk—measured four teen inches. ACCIDENT.—A painful and somewhat serious accident happened to Miss Abbott, daughter of Mr. Henry Abbott, of Verulam, while driving with her sister to the Falls on Sunday morning to attend the Baptist church. When near Mr. Andrew Rutherford's, their horse was frightened by some cattle in the bushes at the road-side, and jumped so suddenly that the king bolt of the buggy was broken. The front end of the reach then fell and stuck into the ground, which caused the hind wheels of the buggy to rise, and both of its occupants were thrown out. The younger of the two escaped unhurt; but her sister's lower lip was cut completely through, one of her nostrils out slightly, and an upper eyelid badly abraded. Mr. Rutherford drove the young ladies to the Falls, where the wounds were sown up and dressed by Dr. Graham; and the Misses Abbott then went to the residence of their sister, Mrs. Foster Kelly, on Francis street east, where the elder is still under the doctor's care.

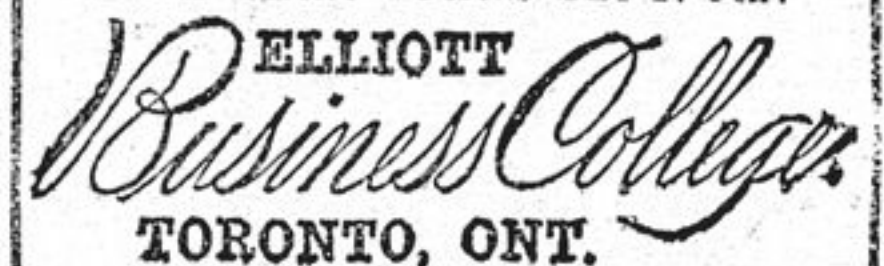
