CAR ON FIRE.—A box car which had been loaded with charcoal on the chemical works siding on Wednesday, took fire about four o'clock on Thursday morning, and was considerably damaged before the brigade and mill hands got a stream at it. It is thought there must have been fire in the charcoal when it was loaded.

NORTHERN ONTARIO.—The March issue of "Red and Gun in Canada" contains an interesting article from the pen of Mr. James Dickson, D. L. S., of Fenelon Falls, entitled "Exploring in Northern Ontario." It gives a detailed account of his trip through the country between the Mattagami River and Lake Abitibi last summer, and has several half-tone illustrations of the picturesque waters of that region.

FIRE IN FENELON.—On Tuesday night Mr. Thos. Graham, whose farm is near Valentia, in Fenelon, suffered a heavy loss by fire, which was caused by the explosion of a lantern he had taken into the barn. Besides the building, over a thousand bushels of grain, about fifteen tons of hay and some small articles were destroyed, and three head of cattle and ten pigs were burned to death. We have no reliable information as to insurance.

FIRE ALARM.—About 10 a. m. on Tuesday a fire started from some unknown cause among some rubbish lying on the floor in the rear of the premises on Colborne street lately vacated by Mr. D. Stinson—the same place that the fire occurred on Dec. 30th last, and which has been unoccupied since that time, the damage done by the former fire not having yet been repaired. The smoke was noticed, and the fire was discovered and quenched before it had made any headway; but if it had occurred in the night there might have been a different story to tell. The origin of the blaze is a complete mystery.

ILLEGAL FISHING.—The Peterborough Review is credibly informed that a man who resides in the vicinity of Chemung lake was in Peterborough lately with about 500 pounds of maskinonge, which he was offering for sale. The fish were caught with a snare, contrary to the provision of the game laws, which, however, permit the catching of maskinonge with hook and line. The Review does not say that the man, who is not an Indian, is to be prosecuted, as he certainly ought to be. The frequent violations of the game laws, regarding either "fish, fowl or fowl," are very discreditably to the officials entrusted with their enforcement.

Mr. W. Jobe, of Kirkfield, was in Peterborough to-day (the 21st.) Mr. Jobe was formerly connected with the Lift Lock on the Trent Valley Canal at Peterborough, and at the present time is in charge of the Kirkfield Lock for the Dominion Bridge Company. As soon as navigation opens in the spring the Kirkfield Lock will be ready to operate, and Mr. Jobe expects that the coming season will be a busy one for the staff of the canal on that section. —Review.

Mr. Malcolm Cole, formerly of Lindsay and Kinnmount, who was reported to have been so badly frozen early in the winter that he died in the hospital at Saskatoon, Sask., has been heard from, and is alive and well; which news his friends in this locality will be very glad to hear.

A surprised man was Mr. Winslow, of Cavan, on Saturday night, when P. C. McGinty arrested him at the Cavanagh house for refusing to pay a newsboy a cent for a paper. The little fellow sold him a paper, and after writing some time for the money, asked for it. The pay was not forthcoming after repeated petitions, and the boy decided upon another means. P. C. McGinty was brought in and arrested the man, who was taken to the police station, where the boy got a square deal. —Peterborough Examiner.
