#### Individual Responsibility.

The following article, from the Toronto World of Monday last, is exactly the kind that the Gazette delights to reproduce in its columns:

"Speaking of the celebration exercises on Independence Day at the Jamestown Exhibition, Dr. Woodrow Wilson, of the Princetown University, made an important contribution to corporation ethics. His theme was individual accountability for the acts of corporations, and his remedy for the monopolistic tendencies and the unlawful practices of modern public service and industrial incorporated companies in the United States, was the arrest and imprisonment of corporation heads, instead of the fining or dissolution of corporations themselves. In advocating this, the Princetown president undoubtedly struck at a real and serious defect in company law as it has been developed in both the United States and Canada. The fiction that makes incorporated companies a separate person in law has been carried to an absurd and dangerous extreme; and when that happens, as a United States judge once observed, it is disregarded.

The kind of law Canada needs is that which will attack and punish presidents and general managers of railroads for evasions and violations of the statutes. It is just as absurd, said Dr. Wilson, to indict or dissolve corporations for offences against the public as it would be to arrest and confiscate automobiles because their owners killed pedestrians. If the individual is made responsible, the president is convinced, the difficulty will be solved."

#### Lift Lock Opening.

The new hydraulic lift lock at Kirkfield, on the Balsam lake and Lake Simcoe section of the Trent Canal system, was formally opened on Saturday last by the Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Postmaster-General, and navigation is now open from Heeley's Falls, on the Trent river, to Barrie, Orillia, and other Lake Simcoe ports, making a continuous waterway of about 160 miles. About 2,000 people assembled at the lock to witness the opening ceremonies, almost everyone in that section of the country being present, while large numbers went on the excursion boats from the Falls, Lindsay, Orillia and some other points. The official party, together with about two hundred invited guests from Peterborough, Lindsay and Fenelon Falls, on board the steamer "Stoney Lake," reached the lock at about 2.30 p. m., amid the cheers of the crowd and the tooting of the whistles of the assembled steamers. The boat was immediately run into the south pontoon and the gate closed behind her, and less than ten minutes later was floating on the lower stretch of the canal, the time occupied in the actual operation of making the descent of 481 feet being just three minutes. The Government steamers "Sovereign" and "Bob Hall," which accompanied the larger boat and carried part of the crowd, were then lowered in the north pontoon. The address delivered by the Hon. Mr. Lemieux was very interesting, and was followed by shorter speeches by Messrs. R. R. Hall, M. P. for East Peterborough, R. J. McLaughlin, K. C., Sam Hughes, M. P. for Victoria and Haliburton, George Grant, M. P. for North Ontario, Senator Cox and J. R. Stratton. Mr. McLaughlin acted as chairman, introducing the various speakers. At the conclusion of the speaking, the steamers proceeded down the canal, passing through five locks on the way, to Lake Simcoe, the total descent from Balsam lake being 120 feet. Lake Simcoe, one of the most beautiful sheets of water in Ontario, was reached about 7 o'clock, and a sail of a couple of miles down its east shore brought the party to Beaverton, where a special train was waiting to convey the people to Lindsay, at which point connection was made for Peterborough and Fenelon Falls.

The new lift lock is an imposing structure, and, the towers being built of steel, much more of the mechanism can be seen than is the case at the Peterborough lock, where the towers are built of concrete. The lock cost about \$300,000, exclusive of the concrete breast walls, and is a splendid piece of engineering work. The effect of the opening of the new section of canal will soon be felt on the local waters, and excursions to Lake Simcoe points are already being talked of.

### Counterfeiters in Lindsay.

The Dominion police made a rich haul on Monday evening of this week, when Charles Burke, of Lindsay, was arrested by Chief Vincent, of that town, Dominion Detective Parkinson, of Ottawa, and Detective Cosvan, of Toronto, on the charge of being the head of a gang who have for some time been manufacturing and circulating bogus five-dollar Traders' Bank bills. On the same day R. Wynn and A. Boyeau, former residents of Lindsay and its vicinity, were arrested at. Sault Ste Marie, Mich., as members of the gang, they having been engaged in passing the c. u iterfeit bills. It is thought that the gang have been at work for a long time counterfeiting the bills of various banks. An Englishman who was engaged in passing the bills near Montreal, and was arrested, gave the information which resulted in the round-up. Warrants are out for the arrest of several other suspected persons. Burke was brought before Police-Magistrate Jackson shortly after his arrest, and was remanded to the county jail for eight days.
