

The Millbrook electric light plant has been purchased by Messrs. John and James Davidson, of Smith's Falls, and an improvement in the service is expected.

The reorganized Wm. Hamilton Company, of Peterborough, has been granted a charter by the Ontario government. The new concern is capitalized at \$300,000.

A resident of Peterborough county, 75 years of age, was never on a railway train until Friday of last week, when he started on a journey to Seattle to visit members of his family.

A Goderich man was lying in a hammock at Chemung Park on the 15th ult., when the hammock broke and he fell on a small stump, sustaining injuries to his spine from the effects of which he died in the Peterborough hospital on Thursday of last week.

The Norwood "Register" says that a couple of surveyors in the employ of the Dominion Government have been engaged in the vicinity of Tweed for the past few days locating the highest points in the district. It is the intention of the government to build a series of towers on the highest points in the country for observation purposes, similar to those of the United States coast survey.

Two hundred excursionists left Barrie per steamer "Islay," on July 16th, for the Trent Valley Canal. When passing through Lock Three the shaft broke, and the boat was tied up all night. Provisions were so scarce that some of the passengers, who slept on the decks, the floors and the tables, had nothing to eat until they reached Barrie at 11.30 next day. Food was bought from farmers in the neighborhood of the lock by Captain McInnis, who did everything he could for the comfort of the crowd. On reaching Barrie he was cheered lustily by the returned passengers and several hundred people who were anxiously awaiting the arrival of the boat.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.
2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.
3. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.
4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscribers bound to pay for it he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
