

Mr. W. L. Shields, general merchant, who had a considerable quantity of groceries therein. By the prompt action and desperate exertions of the villagers, who formed a "bucket brigade" at the earliest possible moment, the fire was confined to the two buildings mentioned. If we are correctly informed, the church was insured for \$2,000; but there was no insurance whatever on the storehouse or its contents.

**ACCIDENT.**—On Monday morning Mr. Thomas Junkin, of Verulam, met with an accident by which he would probably have lost his life if had happened where there was nobody to help him. He was driving a creamery wagon with several cans thereon to the Falls, and when opposite the residence of his brother, Mr. John W. Junkin, by some means (accounts conflict as to exactly how it happened) the wagon was upset into the ditch at the roadside. Mr. Junkin fell, face down, on some gravel in the ditch, and the edge of the platform of the wagon rested on his back. Fortunately the horses did not attempt to move, though one of them (a colt) was somewhat fractious just before the accident. Mr. Junkin was released by his nephew Randolph and two or three others; and Dr. Graham, who is attending him, has hopes that he is not seriously injured, though he complained of a good deal of pain in his chest and his left thigh, upon neither of which, however, is there any external mark. His face was badly scraped and punctured by the gravel into which it was forced, there was a slight cut above his nose and another cut behind one of his ears, and both arms were bruised and blackened and were bleeding from trifling wounds above the wrists; but these hurts are of no importance.

**NEWSPAPER LAW.**

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the payment.

4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is *prima facie* evidence of intentional fraud.
