**The Real Peace Conference.**

The following editorial appeared in the New Hampshire Patriot, published at Hampshire, N. H. The editorial is peculiarly significant, coming as it does from this particular paper. The Patriot was established in 1809, not quite one hundred years ago. It has been a witness of the rise of the nation from a British dependency to what it now is. It followed the agitation for the abolition of slavery from its inception to its completion. It has seen the rise and fall of every political party that has played its little part in American affairs. Its present editor has evidently followed the course of Socialism closely; otherwise he could not have written the following editorial. It is worth preserving—it is worth a careful reading. More, it is worth being marked with a blue pencil and handed to your neighbor or mailed to a distant friend:

There is no doubt but what good will come out of the recent Hague conference. Every effort in the direction of national and international peace carries with it a blessing. Men competent to judge in-

assist, however, that the conferences at The Hague bind no nation, and that war will continue while rulers and administrators continue to take offence. These say that it is not the men who occasion the fighting who do the fighting. It is not they who make food for cannon; it is not they who leave widows and orphans to mourn, and, as long as it is not, war will continue.

It is possible that more practical good will come out of the International Socialist congress, composed of delegates from twenty-five different countries, the principal ones being the United States, Great Britain, Germany, France, Russia, Japan, Australia, Norway and Sweden. At The Hague conference there is much moral suasion, many appeals to tender sensibilities; but the question of personal interest is largely excluded or overlooked. At the Socialist congress personal interest is the controlling factor—hence this clause in the Socialist propaganda:

"As soon as a situation shall be presented which, openly or secretly, may give rise to an apprehension of a conflict between two or more governments, and render a war between them possible or probable, the Socialist parties of the countries concerned should at once, and upon the invitation of the International Socialist bureau, enter into direct communication with a view to determining upon a concerted mode of action on the part of the Socialists and workmen of the interested countries in order to prevent the war."

"At the same time the Socialist parties of the other countries should be advised by the secretary of the bureau, and a meeting of the International Socialist bureau shall be held as soon thereafter as possible for the purpose of devising the most appropriate measures to be taken by the entire international Socialist movement and the organized working class to prevent the war."

The well-informed Socialist, like the ancient Greek philosopher, claims affiliation, on the basis of patriotism, with no country, but says: "The world is my country, and every man my brother."

The Socialist organization to-day is the strongest political organization on earth; and when that organization represents to its membership a certain course of action, and the members realize its inherent worth and decide to act upon the recommendation, the influence cannot fail to be felt.

There are those who insist that the Socialist movement is not twenty millions strong; and when twenty millions of wide-awake, active, industrious, interested and energetic men and women in the civilized world demand peace, the cry for peace will cease to be a dream.

There is not much doubt in the minds of those who have watched the trend of events that when the Socialists of Germany informed the emperor of Germany that if he engaged in a war of conquest they would refuse to fight beneath his banner, the information had a very salutary and peace-creating effect upon Germany's ruler.

There is not much doubt that if the Socialists of Norway and Sweden, when those countries separated for purpose of government, had not declared to those in authority that they would not fight against each other, peace would not have prevailed.

In Germany there are 3,250,000 citizens enrolled in the Socialist party, and when war was being talked of between Germany and France, the Socialists of both countries conferred with one another, and the result was peace.

There may be much in the Socialist propaganda that you do not like, and there may be much of it of which you have no knowledge; but if Socialism can make for permanent peace between nations, that one thing should commend it to the consideration of all men.

**Equality Before the Law.**

Louis Glass, the multi-millionaire briber of San Francisco, is in jail, but not so much in jail as some people. A San Francisco paper says that three days in the county jail has made Glass the master of the jailers. He lives in the best part of the prison house, eats specially prepared foods and is permitted to roam about, while his fellow prisoners are caged tight in their cells because they haven't the coin that makes Glass the master of the situation. It's the same old story of the privileges enjoyed by the rich, both in and out of jail, and often without parting with any of the money that commands these favors. The old song about "Equality before the law" is becoming more of a chestnut every day. —Appeal to Reason.
