

**District Notes.**

Port Perry duck hunters are having good sport on Lake Scugog.

Power development of the celebrated Henry Falls and Rapids was commenced on Wednesday of last week.

Sixteen pounds of butter were manufactured at Shriver cheese factory recently from 4,000 pounds of whey.

On and after November 1st the merchants of Norwood will pay one cent more per pound for butter in prints than in rolls.

Campbellford citizens have voted \$30,000 to develop a municipal electric power plant. The poll stood 296 for, and 11 against.

**Peterboro' Review:** Traces of graphite in Haliburton county are being investigated by Mr. Eugene McSwaney, president of the United States Graphite Co., Saginaw, Mich. It is said the deposits are rich along the line of the I. B. & O. railway. Mr. T. Crowley has a very large deposit of first class graphite on the Monk road.

**Post:** On Wednesday evening, at the Presbyterian parsonage in Keene, the wedding of Miss Nellie McNevin, Otonabee, and Mr. J. Jackson, Fenelon Falls, was quietly solemnized, Rev. D. D. McDonald officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Jackson will reside in Fenelon Falls.

During the early hours of the morning of Wednesday of last week, a daring burglary was committed by unknown persons in Market Clerk McIlmoyle's office on the Market Square, Peterboro'. In the morning, when the clerk appeared on the scene, he found money, pencils, ink and several other articles missing, and the door and window open. A couple of dollars of change was all the burglar secured.

**Post:** On the morning of the 23rd the Chicomong stage horses took fright just as the ferry upon which they were about to cross to Ennismore left the Indian Village landing. The horses backed off the ferry, taking the stage—in which a number of passengers were seated—with them. Fortunately the water was not dangerously deep at that point, and all were saved from drowning. There were several narrow escapes.

Supplies are being brought into the village of Havelock almost every day for the C. P. R. grain route which passes through Havelock. They are being stored away in the C. P. R. yard there until they will be needed, and consist of steel rails, fish plates, and telegraph wire. Large quantities have recently been brought in, and, although not officially announced, it is believed that the work will be begun soon on the grain line.

**Post:** Mr. J. H. McClellan, superintendent of the Trent Canal, and Mr. C. Gordon, overseer of the canal, were in town Tuesday evening, arranging with Mr. R. J. McLaughlin for commencing the completion of the road over McLaren's creek. It was arranged that the dredge should commence operations on Monday next, and the work will be pushed with vigor. It is expected that the dredge will be able to work until Christmas.

**Post:** Judgment was given by Police Magistrate F. D. Moore in the case of Wm. B. Fee against the Baker & Bryans Co., Ltd., for damages for injury to a fence belonging to Fee, to which the Baker & Bryans Co. had snubbed two heavy cribs of logs in August last. The case has been regarded as important, as bearing on the question of the made land opposite the park lots in the township of Cps. and on the question of the ownership of the bed of the River Scugog, which Mr. Fee asserts is private property.

The road case, between Lee Brothers and the township of Somerville, which has been attracting considerable attention in Norland for some time past, was disposed of on the 15th inst. by a municipal board of arbitrators, composed of Messrs. M. Greer, Jr., J. Hodgins and J. Rumney. The case hung, chiefly, upon the true location of the road allowance in front of con. A., at lots 2 and 3. Mr. Smith, O. L. S., of Lindsay, who was present at the request of the board, examined fourteen or fifteen witnesses as to the government movements, etc., which resulted in convincing the board that Lee Bros. owned only a strip of swamp land, 18 feet wide at the narrowest place, between the bay and the con. line. The board awarded Lee Bros. \$15 for sufficient of the land to give the council's road allowance access to the lake; the council to pay in addition the costs of the arbitration, amounting to \$90.—*Post correspondence.*

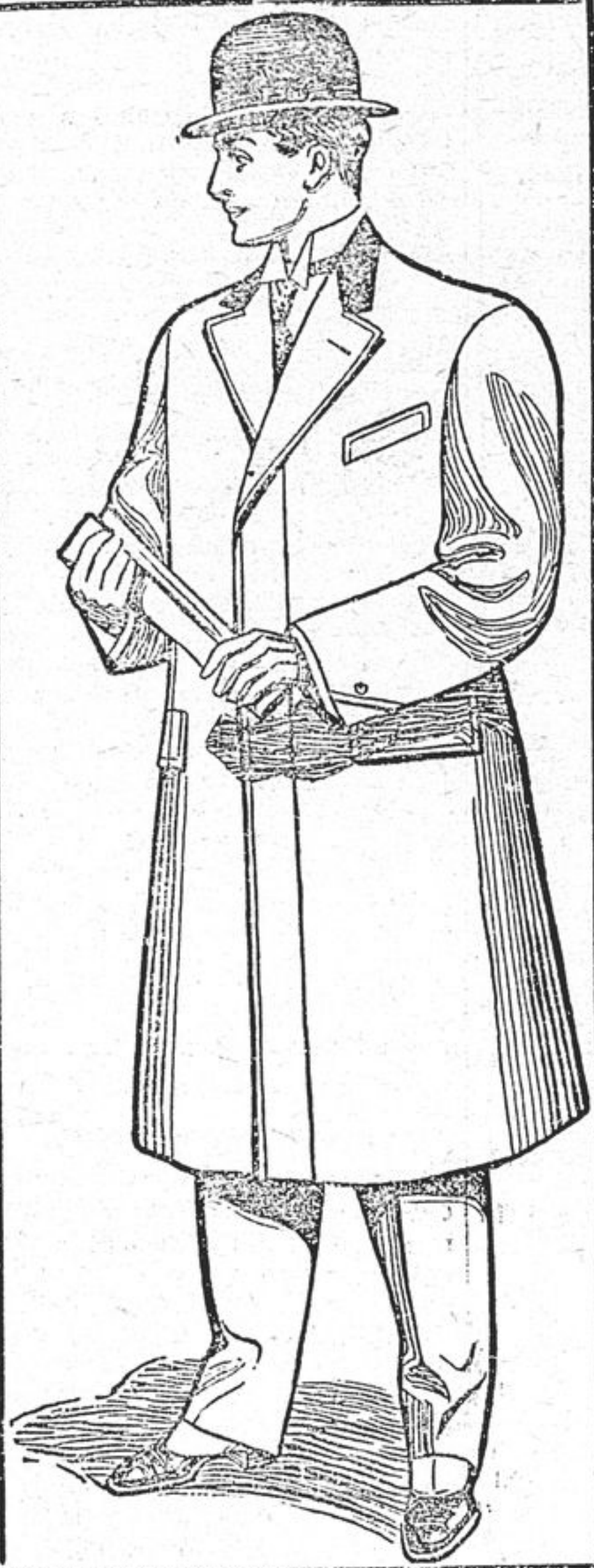

**POST-OFFICE—F. J. KERR, POSTMASTER.** Open daily, Sundays excepted, from 7:30 a. m. to 7 p. m. Mail going south closes at 7 p. m. Letters for registration must be posted half an hour previous to the time for closing the mails.

**NEWSPAPER LAW.**

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.

4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is *prima facie* evidence of intentional fraud.
