The Roseneath cheese factory, in Hastings county, was destroyed by fire early on the morning of Wednesday, the 13th inst. Considerable stock was on hand in the factory, and also a large amount of cash, which we understand was also consumed.

While going through the woods a twig had pierced his left eye, the sight of which will probably be destroyed.

Bob. Ind.: Mr. James Seymour, of Bob-baycon, shipped this week a carload of apples to Holmfild, in Manitoba. They were a good sample of apple, and a large demand exists in the West for apples. This section is favorable for the growth of apples, and the farmers could make large returns from their orchards if they would give them proper care. One great fault in the district is the multiplicity of varieties. Those who set out trees do not go about it as a business, but take any variety that the tree peddlars like to load them with. There are far too many summer apples that are no use for shipping, and to get a carload of any one variety, a buyer has to scour the township. Unity of purpose is much needed in fruit growing, and the Agricultural Society might do much good by having a series of meetings throughout the neighborhood to discuss this work. Those who contemplate setting out trees should settle on two, or at most three, varieties of winter apples that have proved most suited to the district. The marketing would then be accomplished with the greatest convenience and advantage. Unity of action among farmers would add greatly to their incomes.

POST-OFFICE—F. J. KERR, POSTMASTER. Open daily, Sundays excepted, from 7.30 a. m. to 7 p. m. Mail going south closes at 7 p. m. Letters for registration must be posted half an hour previous to the time for closing the mails.

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.
2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.
3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.
4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for it he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
