(1) When a Rink is incomplete, the player who is taken on must not rank higher than the absent player. For the violation of this rule a penlaty of 1 nark for each grade he ranks in his rink. Viz: Second stone, 2; Third stone 3; Skip 4. Under no circumstances must a skip substitute above second stone. (By way of explanation, if a vice-skip substitutes for a lead, the opposing rink counts three points.)

(2) Schedule games shall be forfeited against the absent skip if the game is mot started by 7.45.

(3) Twelve ends shall constitute a game. (4) First skip at the rink shall have

the choice of ice. (5) If a skip finds it impossible to play a game he must give notice to the opposing skip not later than 5 o'clock in the evening on which the game was to ing? have been played, when they may arrange to have the game played at some other time; otherwise the game shall ount as a default as above stated.

(6) If a dispute arises over a game, the matter must be referred to the Managing Committee, through the Secretary, and the committee's decision shall be final.

(7) As this competion is for the cup donated by Mr. J. H. Brandon, it is essential that all scores be handed to the Secretary to enable him to keep a correct record of the games. At the end of the season he shall declare the winner of the cup. The Secretary's count will be the only one considered at the end of the season, so the skips will therefore see the necessity of handing in the score of every game, whether a winner or loser.

Notes.

Fis Honor Judge Harding handed out 'his decision in equalization of the assessment of the various municipalities commosing the county. His Honor's report is a very voluminous document. It is altogether too bad that the county could not have been saved the expense resulting from this investigation. No detailed statement of the expense connected therewith is obtainable as yet, but competent authorities estimate the cost to the county to be\$6,000. Judge Harding's fee for holding the investigation amounts to over \$700; Messrs. McDiarmid & Weeks, solicitors for the county, will have a bill amounting to approximately \$1,700, while the stenographer's bill will amount to about \$500 .- Post.

Roland Madill, the young man who was stabbed at Gooderham on Christmas Eve, has made a rapid recovery, the wound in the lung fortunately turning out to be less serious than was at first anticipated. Mr. Morrison, who is said to have inflicted the injuries received by Madill, is still confined in Castle Jackson; but his solicitors, Messrs. Mc-Diarmid & Weeks, intend to press for a speedy trial before Judge Harding, and will ask that the accused be allowed out on bail in the interval. Madill's wounds were inflicted with a common tobacco knife, it is said, and were not at all dangerous. It looks as if the affair was but the outcome of a common brawl engendered by Christmas cheer. Morrison did not escape unscathed-he bears the marks of some severe handling .-- 16

NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. A post-master is required to give notice by letter (returning the paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publisher for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrearges, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is mad, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made. 3. Any person who takes a paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay. 4. If a subscriber orders his paper to be stopped at a certain time and the publisher

continues to send it, the subscriber is bound to pay for if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facis evidence of intentional fraud.
