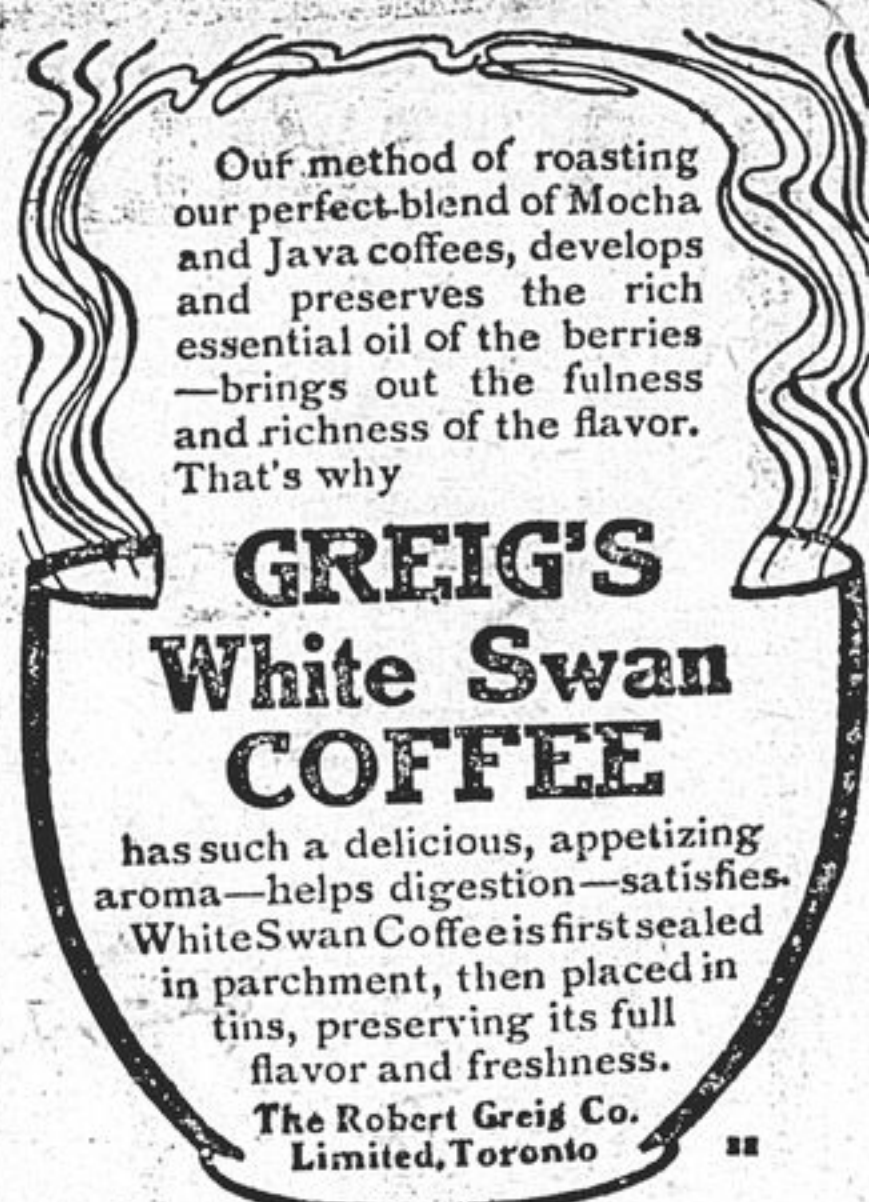

The annual meeting of the Fenelon Agricultural Society was held at the McArthur House on Friday afternoon last, and there was a fairly good attendance. The President Mr. John Aldous, occupied the chair. The secretary-treasurer, Mr. Isaac Naylor, read the minutes of last meeting and the financial statement, both of which were adopted as read. Mr. Aldous was re-elected president, Mr. J. H. Brandon, 1st vice president, Mr. Marshall Moynes, 2nd vice president and Mr. Naylor, secretary-treasurer. The directors appointed were: Messrs. John Knox, Thos. Austin, Fred. Smitheram, Jas. Butchaell, Thos. Isaac, Benjamin Smith, Geo. Goodhand, James Thurston, Duncan Tolmie and Wm. Hetherington jr. Honorary directors, Messrs. Benjamin Butchaell, R. J. Moore, F. McDougall, Dr. Mason, Robt. Connell, Peter Perdue, R. M. Hamilton, W. A. Bishop, E. G. Hand, Oliver Gaspell, and Nelson Hill. The auditors appointed were Mr. W. H. Robson and Dr. Sims. The president and secretary will attend the fairs and exhibitions meeting to be held in Toronto on Feb. 19th and 20th, and the president, first and second vice presidents and secretary were appointed a delegation to interview the township council in the interests of the society. A vote of thanks was moved to Mr. Thos. Austin for the painstaking interest he has devoted to the fair during 1908 fair on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 6th and 7th.

Fenelon Council.

Council met according to statute. The following members took the declarations as councillors for 1908: Reeve Taylor Parkin; councillors, A. F. Cragg; M. W. Moynes, John T. Palmer, and Duncan Tolmie.

On motion of Messrs. Moynes and Tolmie, Jos. Moynes was appointed assessor for 1908, at a salary of \$70.00. The following motions received the assent of council.

Palmer—Moynes.—That A. F. Cragg be appointed a member of the Board of Health for 3 years.

Cragg—Tolmie.—That Jno. Cundal and W. H. Gullis be appointed to audit the 1907 accounts.

The above appointments were embodied in a by-law which was passed in the usual manner Mr. Palmer in the chair.

Cragg—Tolmie.—That \$5.00 be granted the St. Children's Hospital, Toronto.

Moynes—Tolmie.—That the scrutineers at the several polling divisions be paid \$2.00 each for duties performed at the recent election.

Tolmie—Moynes.—That a by-law be introduced at the next meeting of this council for the purpose of opening con. 6 at lot 25.

Cragg—Palmer.—That M. Moynes and D. Tolmie be appointed to repair the bridge on con. 3, lot 19.

Palmer—Moynes.—That D. Tolmie attend to the fixing of the approaches to the bridge on con. 1, between lots 30 and 31.

Cragg—Palmer.—That the collector notify all parties paying taxes to pay them by Feb. 1st.

Moynes—Tolmie.—That the following bills be paid:

W. H. Powles, for postage and stationery, \$3.23; Jos. Cunningham, for culvert, gravel and gravelling, \$12.70; G. W. Beall, for election supplies, \$7.29; D. R. O's., Poll Clerks, scrutineers and halls \$54.00; Clerk, work re election, \$8.00; O. Gaspell, witness fees re county equalization, \$2.35; A. Sinclair, for 38 load gravel, \$1.90; Robt. Beggs, for 38 load gravel, \$1.90; Taylor Parkin, witness fees re county equalization, \$4.50; M. Maybee, postage and preparing financial statement, \$7.91; H. Sackett, bonus on 40 rods wire fence, \$10.00. Council adjourned to meet at call of Reeve.

Somerville Council.

Carew—Davis.—That W. Wood's offer of \$7 for wood on road allowance between lots 19 and 18 in the 1st con. be accepted.

Fell—Davis.—That the Clerk send the usual subscriptions to Municipal World. Accounts for election expenses were passed and orders given on the Treas.

The following officers were appointed and a by-law passed confirming the same: John Golden, member of the local board of health, D. Eagleson, auditor, and A.B. Townsend, assessor.

Messrs. Carew, Fell and Hoskins were appointed commissioners to purchase piles for foundation of piers at Mitchell's bridge.

The Reeve was instructed to sign petitions praying for Government aid in building bridges, also praying for repeal of Sec. 606 of the Municipal Act.

The council adjourned to meet at the same place on Saturday, Feb. 29th.
