Obituary.

We take the following from the Goderich Signal of the 16th inst.:

"On Thursday last occurred the death of one of Goderich's most respected residents in the person of William Dickson. Notwithstanding his advanced yearshe was eighty-nine at the time of his death-he was always of active habits, and his familiar figure will be much missed from our streets. He was possessed of a rugged constitution and a keen intellect, and was one of the substantial type of gentleman of the earlier generation. The death summons came to him with scarcely any warning, as he had been in his usual health up to within a few hours of the end. Mr. Dickson was born in Galashiels, Scotland, in 1819, and when fourteen years old he came to Canada with his parents, who settled in Renfrew county. He was one of the first citizens of the town of that name, and for many years took an active part in its municipal business, holding, with other offices, that of chairman of the first high school board of Renfrew. In 1865 he moved to Goderich. For twenty years he was governor of the county jail, from which position he retired eleven years ago. Mr. Dickson was a lifelong member of the Presbyterian church, and was one of the elders elected by St. Andrew's church, Renfrew, at its organization. He is survived by three sons-Robert, of St. Mary's, Dr. John F., of Portland, Oregon, and Alexander, of Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan and three daughters-Mrs. Wm. Proudfoot and Miss Dickson, of Goderich, and Mrs. C. L. Crassweller, of Sarnia. The funeral, which was held on Friday, was largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. Jas. A. Anderson and Rev. Dr. McLean, and the pall-bearers were Dr. Strang, D. McDon-
