2 If any person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrearges, or thepublisher may continue to send it until payment is made and collect the wholeamount whether the paper is taken from the office or not There can be no legal? discontinuance until the payment is made. 3. Any person who takes as paper from the post office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has sub-soribedfor not, is responsible for the pay.

4. If a subscriber orders his paper to bestopped at a certain time and the publisher-Continues to send it, the subscriber is bounds o pay for if he takes it from the post-office. This proceeds upon the ground that a mam

must pay for what he uses-5 The courts have decided that refusing: to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them ancalled for, is prima facie evidences

of intentional fraud.
