Smallpox in Galway.

Smallpox has appeared in Galway township, near the Somerville boundary, and three families are at present quarantined in Somerville. There have been various rumors regarding the number of cases at Kinnmount, whereas, as a matter of fact, there is none of the disease at all at Kinnmount, the nearest case being at least five miles distant. The total number of cases quarantined up to Tuesday night was twenty-six. Dr. Frost, of Kinnmount, is Medical Health Officer for Somerville township, and Dr. White, of Kinnmount, holds the same position for Galway township. Dr. Wilson, M. H. O. for Fenelon Falls, has been in communication with the above doctors regarding the matter, and everything possible seems to be being done to corner the disease by vaccination and quarantine. Some members of the committee for the Orange celebration at the Falls on July 13th have been considering the advisability of cancelling it because of the danger of persons having been subjected to infection and carrying it here; but it is expected by the medical men in charge of the outbreak that it will be completely under control before that date. Dr. Bell, the Provincial Medical Inspector, visited the neighborhood last week.
