Wrinkles In Lettuce Growing. 'A combination method of indoor and outdoor lettuce culture that sometimes works nicely is starting head lettuce in the greenhouse, hothed or cold frame and transplanting to the open as soon as the weather is favorable. Not only do we thus get earlier lettuce, but the development of head lettuce seems to be very fine under these conditions. Deacon, Big Boston, May King, Black Seeded Tennisball, Market Gardener's Private Stock, Iceberg and Improved Hanson are varieties suitable for this

combination culture. The last two are curly leaved varieties, but under proper cultural conditions form good heads. The plants are started in the greenhouse, transplanted into flats and hardened off in the cold frames. They are then set in the open ground in rows afteen inches apart and about ten inches apart in the row.

Another wrinkle in the growing of early lettuce is to grow the plants in pots until about the size of that shown in the figure and then transplanted to flats, in which the plants are grown to meturity or at least salable size.


