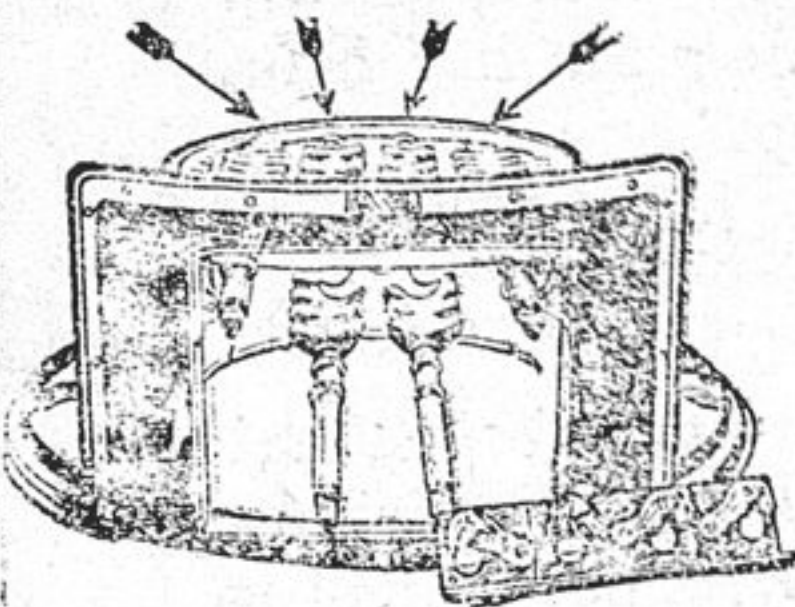

ELECTIONS OCTOBER 26th.

The Dominion Parliament was dissolved on Wednesday, and the election of members for a new Parliament will take place on Monday, October 26th. Nomination day will be one week earlier, October 19th.

The Kinnmount Fair.

The Gateway Township Fair, held at Kinnmount on Thursday and Friday of last week, was a very successful event. The crowd in the northern village was hardly as large as in previous years, but the people who stayed away were not those whose habit it is to help the fair, but those who have formerly made the day an excuse to go on a big drunk and spoil the pleasure of the decent people. The Local Option has effectually put this element out of business in Kinnmount, and a more orderly and enjoyable gathering than that of Friday last was never seen anywhere.

The weather was very fine, though rather too warm for comfort, and the show was good, especially the indoor department. The exhibit of dairy produce, etc., was particularly fine, and the domestic manufactures and fancy work departments contained many very creditable articles. There was a goodly showing of horses in the various classes, and cattle were also fairly represented. Hogs, sheep and poultry, however, appear to reserve little attention from the Gateway farmers, for the two former classes were not represented at all, and the poultry was very scarce and "ornery." Our Gateway friends cannot be aware of the fact that hens and hogs are two of the greatest, if not the very greatest, money earners on the North American continent, or they would take more notice of them.

The horse racing, as usual, attracted the most attention, and the various races were well and closely contested in almost every heat. The time was not particularly fast, as the track, owing to the extremely dry weather, was heavy with sand. Following were the results:

NEW CROSSINGS.—A cement crossing has been laid down this week from the front of the post-office to the opposite side of Colborne street. It was a much needed improvement, and will be greatly appreciated by pedestrians. A similar crossing is being laid at the junction of Lindsay and Helen streets.

NEW LIGHTS.—At a meeting of the village-council held a short time ago, a motion was passed to have four new lights placed on the streets. One of them will be located at the north-west end of Queen street, one on Redher's Point, one on North street, and one on Bond street east, near Dickson's hall.

CHURCH ANNIVERSARY.—The anniversary services in St. Andrew's church on Sabbath, October 18th, and it is expected that the Rev. Professor Ballantyne, D. D., of Knox College, will assist the pastor, and preach morning and evening. The Thanksgiving supper will be given on the evening of the 19th. Full particulars later.

POST-OFFICES.—According to a list received by the Gazette this week from the Post-office Department at Ottawa, there are, within a radius of forty miles from Fenelon Falls, just two hundred and sixty-one post-offices; and, no doubt, persons who don't live within a short distance of either of them, think there ought to be a few more.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday morning Mrs. George Gale, of Rosedale, was driving to the Falls, and while descending Isaac's hill her horse became frightened at a threshing machine and ran away, throwing her out of the buggy. She was taken to her home and Dr. Graham was summoned from the Falls, but up to the time of going to press, we have been unable to learn the extent of her injuries.

THE ITALIAN STABBING CASE.—The examination of Vito Spino, the Italian who stabbed his compatriot, Peter Margaretta, at the Falls on the 2nd inst., took

place at the Ross Hospital, Lindsay, on Monday, before Mr. F. D. Moore, K. C., County Magistrate. After hearing the evidence of the wounded man and the prisoner, adjournment was made until Tuesday afternoon, when Spino was remanded to be tried at the Fall Assizes, which commence on Sept. 28th.

FIRE IN SOMERVILLE.—About eleven o'clock on Wednesday morning the residence of Mr. James Armstrong, on the 2nd concession of Somerville, about 2 1/2 miles from Bury's Green, took fire and was burned to the ground, most of the contents being also destroyed. The fire originated in the roof of an open veranda on which the cook stove stood, and was probably caused by the stove or the pipes. Owing to the extremely dry weather, the fire spread with great rapidity and was soon beyond control. Mr. Armstrong had, we are pleased to hear, some insurance on his house. None of the other farm buildings were near enough to be in danger.

GRANOLITHIC.—The laying of granolithic walks on Oak street, the first of our village streets to have this improvement, was finished this week. The work was done under the supervision of Mr. T. Begg, of Lindsay, and from the appearance of the walks, this gentleman apparently knows his business. A regrettable feature of the work was the removal of the only two remaining oak trees on the north side of the street. One of these trees in particular was a remarkably fine specimen—one of the finest in town. A vigorous protest was raised by the residents of the street when it was learned that the tree was to be cut. An American visitor offered to pay all expenses contingent upon a delay of operations while he consulted the authorities to see if it could not be spared, and it is said he also offered to present the village with a thousand dollars if the tree were left standing. But the tree came down in spite of it all, and the men who were instrumental in having it taken down have not increased their popularity to any great extent by their action. Another freak action was the placing of the words "Oak St." in the walk on one side of the street and "Oak Ave." on the other; presumably because the "avenue" side has two trees remaining on it.
