#### A Successful Fair.

The annual fall fair of the Fenelon Agricultural Society, held at the Falls on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, Cet. 6 and 7, was well up to its usual standard of excellence. The weather was perfect, and the attendance was consequently one of the largest on record. The showing of horses and cattle was first-class, many fine animals being on the ground, but sheep and hogs, especially the latter, appear to be receiving less attention from the farmers than they did ten years ago or so. Poultry were fairly well represented. In the indoor department, the exhibit of grain, roots and vegetables, etc., was good, the roots especially being better than might be expected in such a dry season. Fruit, however, was a smal class. In domestic manufactures and fancy work, the, exhibits while about up to the average in numbers, were of extra good quality. Only one event in the way of a horse race was on the programme. This was a green race in which Mr. John Aldous' mare "Fanny" took first money, winning three straight heats. The prize list will be published as soon as it is received from the secretary.

#### Spino Acquitted.

Vito Spino, the Italian, who was arrested on a charge of having stabbed another Italian at Fenelon Falls on August 31st, came up for trial at the Lindsay assizes on Friday last. As there was no witness of the affray prepared to swear that he saw the prisoner do the stabbing, and as at least two men said they had seen another Italian, immediately after the stabbing, run away from the crowd, throw something into the canal and then make off across the bridge, the jury could only bring in a verdict of "Not Guilty," and Spino was accordingly given his liberty. People are now asking, of course, why Spino was arrested at all, when there was nothing to show that he had committed the crime, and, secondly, why the other man whose actions were so suspicious, not pursued and captured. They also would like to know why this evidence was not taken at the preliminary trial or at the latter hearing at the hospital some time ago. We don't know. We were on the spot two minutes after the stabbing took place, but heard not a word about a man running away and throwing something in the canal, nor did we know such a thing had happened until the fact was brought out at the trial. Neither can we figure out by what process of reasoning it can be argued that Spino received "British fair play."

#### CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette: SIR,-

There has been published in the public press of the town a letter by Col. Sam Hughes, addressed to me. The letter is so grossly insulting and indecent in its tone that it will receive no reply from me. The public, however, deserve an explanation. Four years ago Col. Hughes made a deliberate attempt to ruin my professional character, and he put into every home in this constituency circulars for that purpose, entirely false, one serious charge being supported by an alleged letter, which was afterwards shown to have been a fabrication. The people of Fenelon Falls and the rest of the county will remember that I placed \$100 in the hands of the chairman of the Fenelon Falls meeting, Mr. Thos. Robson, and publicly challenged Col. Hughes to establish the truth of any of these slanderous statement, offering to accept the Secretary of the Conservative Association as referee; and if he were to say that there was a word of truth in any of these slanders, the \$100 was to go to any charitable institution he might direct. The money lay for months in the Pease, hands of Mr. Robson. No reply, even, could ever be obtained to the challenge.

Until Col. Hughes takes up this challenge, I shall not attend any meeting of his. I would be pleased to discuss political questions with any one; but to enter into a contest of vituperation and personal abuse, is a thing I certainly

In 1904 I took occasion to reply to and refute the slanders circulated against myself, and I went no further. In the present campaign I have taken occasion to criticise the address that is in circulation among the people. In my humble judgment the Liberals of Haliburton and Victoria have no right to be called, either directly or by insinuation, "boodlers, personators, repeaters, bogus voters and election crooks," and have so stated. I perhaps stated it strongly, but I think you will agree with me. I believe the general character of the District of Victoria and Haliburton, with comparatively few exceptions, has been good.

In no case have I interested myself in Col. Hughes's personal character or personal affairs, neither have I commented on him in his business relations. He may serve his employers well, for all I know.
