THE OUTLOOK.

The three greatest commercial countries on earth, England, Germany and the United States, are now in the throes of the most severe and sweeping industrial depression ever recorded in history. Factories and shops are closed or their output greatly curtailed, and millions of workmen find themselves in enforced idleness and consequently without means to provide for their sustenance. In England thousands of these unemployed and hungry ones are tramping about the country, and in sheer desperation often resorting to looting and other acts of violence. In Germany conditions are rapidly reaching an equally acute stage; while in the United States fully one fourth of the working force has practically been idle all of this year. In these countries some millions of men will face the coming winter without having earned even one single dollar during the summer season. Just what this will mean to them may be easily imagined. It is safe to say that the coming winter will be as much worse than last winter as that was worse than the previous one.

The best financial and commercial authorities agree that there is nothing in sight to warrant the expectation of a return of industrial activity and "prosperity" for at least some years to come. Even to these financial and commercial sages the future looks none too bright. The crops of the country, more especially of the United States and Canada, have been looked to with longing eyes by the capitalist world to relieve the situation and hasten the return of the "prosperity" that suddenly took wings a year ago. But the season's crop will be swallowed up in the maw of the market within a few short weeks, and the producers will be as poor as before, while the appetite of the capitalist beast will remain as keen as ever.

When workmen by the million are forced into unemployment for a sufficient length of time, they will become desperate and resort to violent methods to relieve their distress. Once they break forth as a destructive force the rule of capital, which has brought their miseries upon them, will be shak-

en to its foundations, or, perchance, brought to an abrupt and inglorious end. The power of repression in the hands of the capitalist rulers will be of no avail against the frenzied onslaughts of maddened millions, driven to desperation by the miseries heaped upon them by the brutality of those rulers and their profit-mongering rule. In the face of such an onslaught capitalist civilization will go down to ignominious defeat and ruin.

The Socialist horizon is replete with signs and portents presaging the approach of a storm that will test the strength of capitalist civilization to the limit. And what is the present ruling class doing, or attempting to do to forefend the storm? The soup-house and repression are all that class has to offer. Its soup-house strength will be tested to its limit during the coming winter. When that limit it reached, it can only resort to the power of repression. That is the last resort. It has nothing further to offer.

In the face of present industrial conditions, which are daily and hourly becoming more acute and unbearable, it is positively ludicrous to witness the efforts of the pinheaded politicians of the various capitalist interests, as they strut their brief hour upon the stage and prate of "better terms," "Asiatic immigration," "our resources," and the other fellows' "graft, rascality and corruption."

The only thing that can avert the necessity of wiping out capitalist rule by a cataclysm of violence and destruction is the awakening of the working class to the line of intelligent action while there is yet time. Prompt political action by the working class will make it possible to remove the incubus of capitalist rule without the violence and bloodshed that must otherwise obtain. The present outlook indicates, however, that the prospects are good for a period of turbulence and upheaval more widespread and sweeping that has hitherto been recorded in history. But the revolution must come, even if it come "shod with iron sandals."—*Western Clarion.*

A DEVICE OF SATAN.

The school board at Lancaster, Ohio, in 1828, refused to permit the school house to be used for the discussion of the question as to whether railroads were practical or not; and the matter was recently called to mind by an old document that reads as follows: "You are welcome to use the school house to debate all proper questions in; but such things as railroads and telegraphs are impossibilities and rank infidelity. There is nothing in the Word of God about them. If God had designed that his intelligent creatures should travel at the frightful speed of fifteen miles an hour, by steam, he would have clearly foretold it through his holy prophets. Same argument is used to-day by similar idiots over permitting school houses to be used by Socialists to discuss economics. There is just as much idiocy in closing school houses and other public buildings to the discussion of sociology as there was in closing them to the discussion of railroads. You have some neighbors about as thick headed as those Ohio fellows were eighty years ago, have n't you? But progress runs over them, else the world would stagnate.—*Appeal to Reason.*
