
with the construction of a new concrete

It is 165 feet in length and has a 10 foot head. The area of Otter Lake is four miles long, by one mile wide, and this new dam will afford a much larger capacity for reserve water. Otter Lake empties into Burnt River, which is one of the feeders of the Trent Valley Canal. A staff of twenty-five men was engaged on the work, which was under the supervision of Mr. J. H. McClellan, superintendent of the Trent Valley Canal, and Mr. Samnel Clegg, of Peterboro.—Post.

Pruning the Current. In general a currant bush should be composed of from five to eight stalks stopped about eighteen to twenty inches in height.
