District Notes.

Four Orillia hotel keepers were last week convicted of selling liquor without licenses.
 The William Hamilton Company, of Peterboro, which went into liquidation some time ago, has been reorganized, and expects to start the large factory going again next week.
 A two-year term for aldermen will go into force in Peterboro at the election in January, when the leading six of the twelve aldermen to be elected will hold office for two years, and hereafter only six will be elected each year.
 Peterborough's fine new Collegiate Institute was formally opened on Friday last, the opening ceremony being performed by the Hon. E. A. Pyne, Minister of Education.
 Orillia town council has decided to reduce the rate of electric lights in that town to 18 cents per month for 16 candle power lights, no matter in what sort of building or how many are used. The former rate was 20 cents per month for houses and 28 cents for stores. Each person using four or more lights will be allowed one light free for outside lighting purposes.
 Mr. W. A. Davis has been appointed postmaster at Bobcaygeon, in place of Mrs. Stewart (nee Miss E. Junkin) resigned.
 In a big fire at the docks at Portland, Maine, on Tuesday last, two car-loads of dressed poultry being shipped by Flavell's, Limited, of Lindsay, to Liverpool, were destroyed. The poultry was worth about \$10,000.
 William Brooks, one of the two prisoners who escaped from Lindsay jail on November 28th, but was caught and returned to that institution, committed suicide by hanging himself with a towel to the bars of the corridor of his cell, about 8 o'clock on Saturday morning. He had been recently sentenced to 18 months in central prison for stealing a horse, and ill treating it to such an extent that it died.

The site selected by the Public Works Department for the fish pond for the propagation of black bass, is a small tributary to the River Trent at Healey's Falls. The creek in which it is to be made will require to be dredged out and the bottom covered with gravel. A dam with slide will also be constructed, so as to keep the water uniform in depth. The surface area will be about 300 feet in length by 100 in breadth. Work will probably be done this winter to make the pond ready for use in the spring, and local anglers are rejoicing at the thought of the benefit the fishing will receive in this vicinity, and also throughout the province.—*Norwood Register.*
