District Notes.

On account of the recent fires in the northern country, resulting in a large quantity of trees being burned out by root, hundreds of cords of wood must be cut and large quantities of logs taken out for lumber this winter, so as to avoid further serious loss. Already contracts have been let, and large numbers of men are, and will be, engaged to get the stuff in a marketable condition.—*Peterborough Review.*

It is said that the temperance party in Peterborough will issue a journal in the interests of the temperance cause in Peterborough in the near future.

Peterborough Board of Trade wants permission from the Hydro-electric Power Commission to harness some water powers north of the city. Failing this, they will apply to the Commission for Niagara power.

A by-law to raise \$30,000 for the purchase of the driving park for exhibition purposes, will be submitted to the people of Peterborough in January.

Lindsay's fine curling rink had a narrow escape from destruction by fire, shortly before noon on Wednesday of last week. The fire originated from the stove-pipes, but was fortunately discovered by the care-taker before it had obtained much headway, and the firemen had little difficulty in putting it out.

Lindsay is considering the advisability of employing a third policeman, as it is felt that the two at present on the staff have more duties than they can do justice to.

Lindsay Board of Trade and business men have started an agitation for cheaper light and power. If they want light and power cheap—really cheap—the best way for them to get it is to move fourteen miles north.

A new sawmill, with a capacity of 15,000 feet of lumber per day, is being built at Lakesfield by Mr. John McGrath, of Peterborough.

Mr. Dan Whetung, Chief of the Chemong Indians, was the first person to drive a team of horses across Chemong Lake on the ice this season. He made the trip on the morning of the 16th inst.

At the municipal election to be held in January, the ratepayers of Bobcaygeon will vote on a by-law to increase the fee for liquor licenses in the village to \$500.

Cameron, Dec. 15th, 1908.
Council met as per adjournment motion. Present, the reeve, Taylor Parkin, and councillors A. F. Cragg, John T. Palmer, M. W. Moynes and Duncan Tolmie. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved on motion of Messrs. Cragg and Tolmie.

The following communications were received: From W. Webster, giving an

account of repairs to Ferrin's bridge; from the clerk of Ops, asking Fenelon to pay Ops \$2.50, being half the cost of repairs to a culvert broken by a traction engine on the Ops and Fenelon boundary; and from John Brien, giving information re road-work and gravel on his beat.

The By-law to change the Poll at No. 5 division from the late J. L. Brown's to that of Joseph Carpenter was given its three readings and signed and sealed Mr. Tolmie in the chair. This By-law also made arrangements for the annual municipal elections. The following motions were passed by council:

Palmer—Tolmie.—That a grant of \$15 be made to the Fenelon Agricultural Society.

Cragg—Palmer.—That a grant of eight dollars be given to the East Victoria Farmer's Institute.

Palmer—Cragg.—That E. Kendall's bill of \$43.00 for rebuilding the bridge on con. 6, lot 15, be paid.

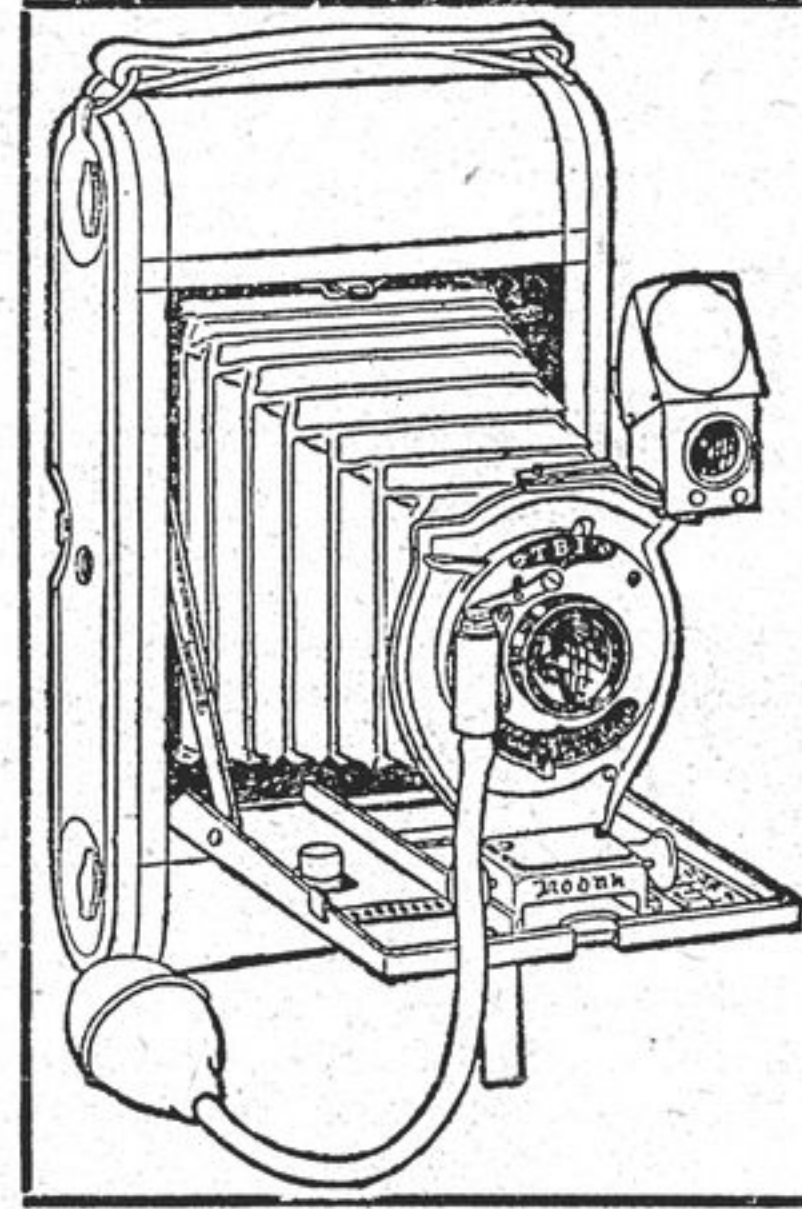
Moynes—Tolmie.—That \$40.00 be paid the collector on salary acct.

Cragg—Palmer.—That a rebate of \$3 be allowed Robt. Graham in his taxes.

Tolmie—Moynes.—That the following bills be paid: John Hay, for gravelling on his beat \$30.00; W. H. Powles, for postage and stationery, \$2.35; P. Kennedy, half cost of culvert on Ops and Fenelon boundary, \$2.50; John Brien, refund an gravel expense \$1.00; James Harvey, culvert on his beat, \$4.00; Wes. Webster, repairs to Ferrin's bridge \$7.00; James Rodgers, for culvert on his beat, \$1.50; F. Northey, for cement tile, \$14.05; W. Townsend, pins for Kendall's bridge 75c; T. Parkin, commissioner's fees on above bridge \$1.75; Treas. Maybee, on salary, \$40.00; M. Maybee, for use of hall for meeting, \$2.00.

Meeting then adjourned.
