

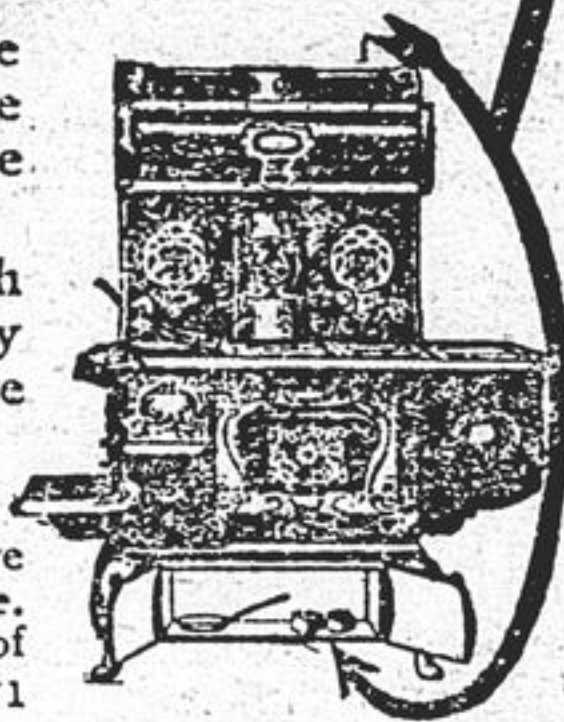

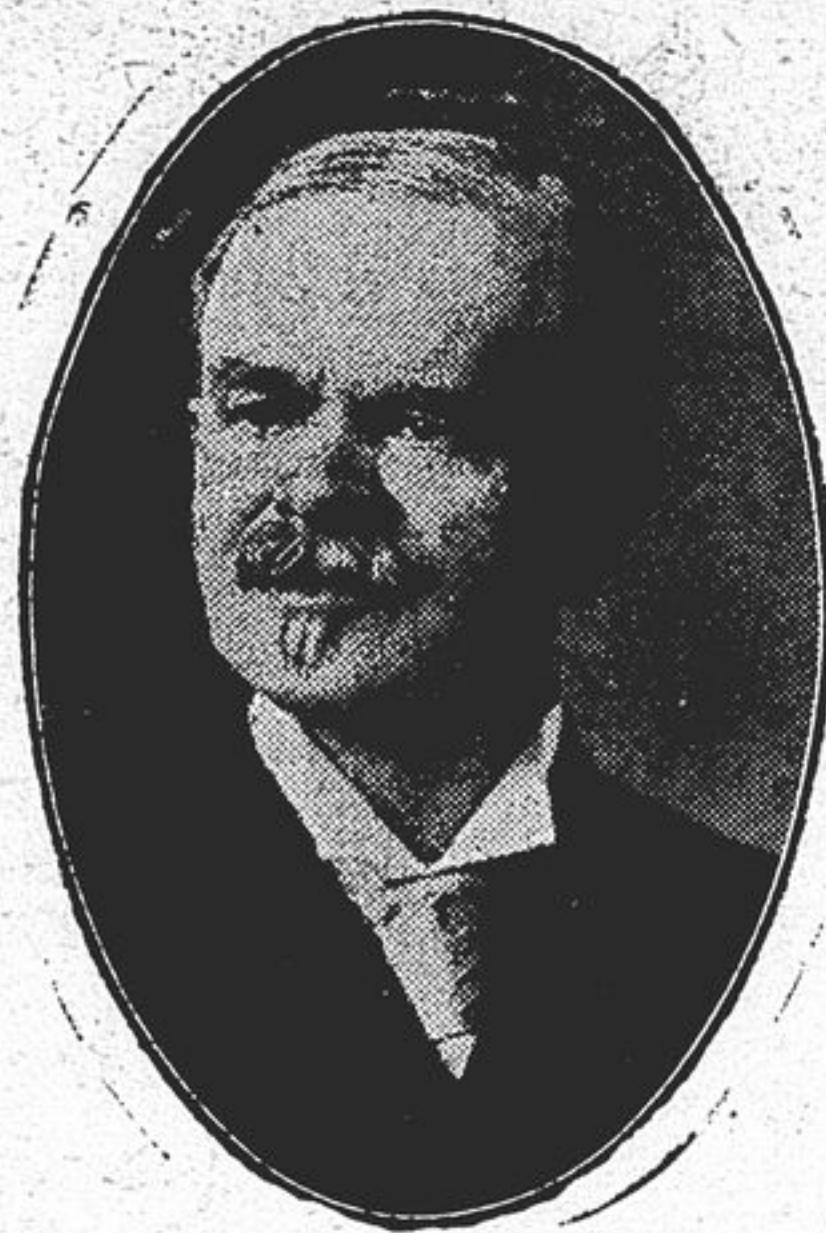

Dr. Wilson Banquetted.

At the Hotel Kawartha, on Wednesday evening, a most enjoyable banquet was tendered Dr. A. Wilson by the Liberals of Fenelon Falls, on the eve of his removal from this village to take up his residence in Toronto. The large dining room and drawing room of the hotel were beautifully decorated with flags, bunting, etc. for the occasion, and the more than one hundred persons who sat down to the tables shortly after nine o'clock enjoyed a gastronomic treat such as has seldom been equalled in the village. At the table of honor sat the guest of the evening with Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, K. C., Dr. R. M. Mason, reeve of the village and Warden of the county, Dr. Blanchard, President of the Victoria and Haliburton Liberal Association, Mr. Thos. Stewart, Mr. John Austin, Mr. W. T. Junkin and Mr. Charles Junkin, of Cannington.

After the many good things on the menu had been disposed of, Mr. W. T. Junkin took the chair, and the secretary, Mr. E. Fitzgerald, read letters of regret from the Honorable J. R. Stratton, of Peterborough, Judge Barron, of Stratford and Mr. G. H. Wilson, of Lindsay, all of whom were unable to be present. The first toast on the list was that of the King, which, after the singing of the National Anthem, was proposed by Dr. Mason and responded to by Mr. McLaughlin. The Canadian Parliaments were then proposed by Mr. John Austin, and Mr. Thomas Stewart responded. The next toast, that of the guest of honor, which was proposed by the Rev. W. J. M. Craig, brought forth the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow" followed by three hearty cheers and a "tiger."

In his reply, Dr. Wilson spoke in a renaissance vein, reviewing past occurrences in connection with the recent election campaign, and with his long residence in the village, and thanked his friends for the kindness and honor shown him.

THE DOCTOR CANED.

At the conclusion of his speech, Dr. Wilson was confronted by Mr. E. A. Pearce, secretary of the local committee in the recent campaign, armed with an exceptionally handsome gold-headed cane, which he asked the doctor to accept as a token of remembrance from the Liberals of Fenelon Falls, and which the doctor did, after thanking the donors very nicely for their gift.

The other toasts proposed were to the County Liberal Association, by Mr. W. H. Robson, the learned professions by Mr. T. C. Birchard, of Cobocook, and the ladies, by Dr. Johnstone. These were responded to respectively by Dr. Blanchard, the Rev. C. S. Lord and Mr. Chas. Junkin, and, after singing "Auld Lang Syne," the assembly dispersed about 12:30.

Obituary.

The death of Mr. Edward Chambers, Sr., of this village, which took place at his residence on Bond street west on Monday morning, removes one of the oldest and most widely known residents of this community. Deceased had been in poor health for some time, but his condition was not considered serious until a few days before his death, when he suffered a paralytic stroke. Edward Chambers was born at Stromness, Orkney, Scotland, on May 13th, 1833, and came to Canada at the age of 13 years with his parents, who settled in the township of Monaghan. Forty-two years ago he came to Fenelon Falls, and some time later took up a farm in Verulam township, where he lived until eight years ago when he returned to the village. He is survived by a widow, six sons and two daughters. The sons are Joseph James, Edward and Frederick, of Fenelon Falls, David of Beaufort, Monaghan, and Thos. who lives on the old homestead in Verulam. The daughters are Mrs. John Thompson, of Verulam township, near Dunstford, and Mrs. Robt. Brown, of Toronto.

Regular meeting. All members present, except Mr. Connel. Minutes of two last meetings read and approved.

The clerk was instructed to present an account to the T. V. C. supt for \$40, cost of cement walk along Gov't property on Oak St.

A motion was carried that W. L. Robson be paid \$15 more on salary as treasurer from Jan. 1st, 1908.

Deyman—Sims, That the Fenelon Agricultural Society be granted \$25, to be supplemented by \$10 if the Fenelon Tp. council advances in proportion.—Ctd.

It was decided to purchase a five-foot snow plow at \$40, through F. Kelly; also to allow the chief of police \$20 for suit of clothes for year past; and to sell the old Sandford pump to F. Kelly for all water needed for corporation purposes for one year, 1909, for street purposes.
