District Notes.

Mr. William Harrison, of Anson township, had one of his toes cut completely off while working in the Gull River Lumber Co's camp north of Minden last week.

Section No. 7, of the Ontario-Rice division of the Trent Canal, extending from Rice Lake to Heeley's Falls, a distance of about 20 miles, has been let to Mr. Randolph McDonald, of Toronto. Only two sections of the Ontario-Rice Lake division now remain to be let.

The first electric locomotive ever built in Canada was turned out by the Canada General Electric works. It has gone to Shawanigan Falls, Que., where it will be used. It weighs fifty six tons.

The Bell Telephone Co. inaugurated the "central energy" system in Lindsay on Friday last. This system does away with the individual telephone users having to ring bells to call central or "ring off".

St. Mary's Roman Catholic church at Lindsay was badly damaged by fire on Monday night. The vestry was completely gutted, and many of the valuable properties used in the church service were destroyed. The tower suffered considerably, but the flames were prevented from reaching the main body of the church, which was damaged only by smoke and water. The firemen had one of the hardest times in their history, working from 11 p. m. until 3 in the morning before the fire was extinguished. The loss will probably be in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

A fire in which eleven horses and a cow were burned to death is reported from the Mickle camps at Hollow Lake. The fire occurred on Sunday the 6th inst.
