Fenelon Falls, January 11th, 1909. Council met pursuant to statute. The following gentlemen subscribed to the necessary declaration of office and took their seats.

Moss, drying hose, 75c. T. Lodge, work on streets, 45c.; J. Jones, salary to date, 35.00; W. H. Robson, Board of Health acct. 1.40.

By-laws were passed extending the time for the collectors roll; providing for the election to fill the vacancies for councillors; appointing a board of health and M. H. O.; and appointing auditors.

Northey-Corbett.—That the regular meeting of the ensuing year be held on the second Monday in each month at the hour of 8 p. m.

The Clerk was instructed to ask for applicants for the position of assessor.
