Socialism would make your uncertainty of ownership any greater? More than that, you are now paying a tax to the trusts and capitalist combinations that is greater in amount and more threatening in its consequences. It is because of this tax paid to private interests that you struggled for ten years to so much as get the deed. You have been dividing and sharing the proceeds of your labor with the hold-up men of high finance to such an extent that it has kept your nose to the grindstone all these years; and now you refuse to escape the greater tax and the violence done you for fear that, some way and some how, the wicked Socialists are going to rob you of your farm.

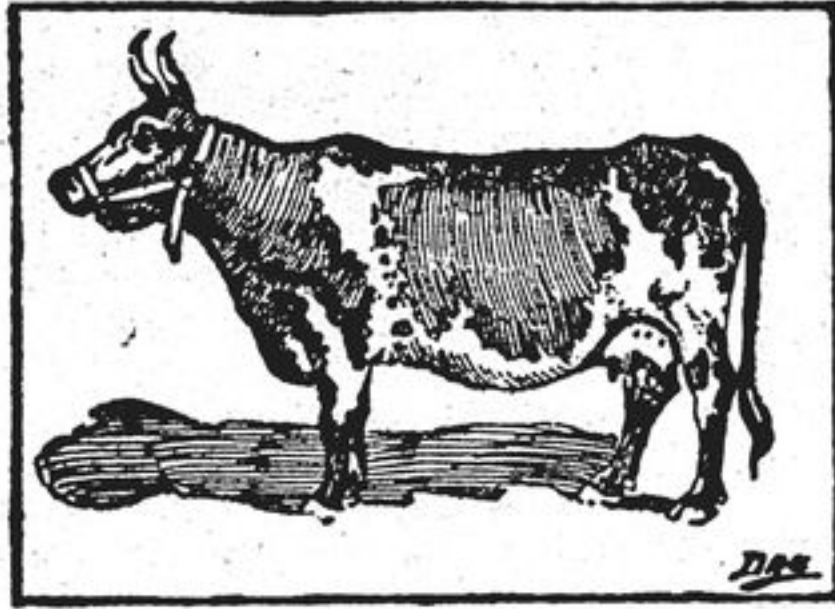
The Socialists do not want your farm. They want to reorganize all farming and all industry, so that every man who works may have and enjoy all the values his labor creates. They want to pull the capitalist off your back and off the shoulders of all men who labor. They want you, as all other men, to reap what you sow and gather the full produce of your labor, undiminished by exactions of profit mongers. They would see you have the use of so much land as you can till, without having to buy it from land sharks and speculators; and if a Socialist administration were to exercise collective ownership of all land, including your little farm, it would not be to oust you or anyone

else, but to preclude the possibility of landlords coming between the man who farms and the land which he must use in order to produce the means of life. —Appeal to Reason.

A Vermont Ayr-hr Herd.

This herd was established by the purchase of a bull and six heifers and an occasional purchase afterward of a noted cow or well bred heifer with a view of improving the herd. The bulls used have been the best that could be found, from cows of noted dairy quality and long teats. The best heifer calves from the best cows have been annually kept to take the place of the old cows or such as could not reach the herd standard. The milk from each cow is weighed at each milking.

In summer the cows are driven about one and one-quarter miles to pasture, with a small night pasture near the barn. They are milked in the stable

and are fed from one-half to two pounds of spring wheat bran at each milking. During the fall they have the run of the meadows. In winter they are fed all the low meadow hay they will eat clean and from one pound to four pounds of bran, the fresh cows having two pounds of mixed feed in addition. This mixture is ground barley, cottonseed meal, linseed oil meal, gluten meal, equal parts by weight. The grain is fed once a day on about one-third bushel ensilage. The cows are turned out to drink at a tub of running water twice each day, and on pleasant days they remain out an hour or two in the middle of the day.

In breeding and selecting cows for this herd careful attention has been paid to the dairy ability of each cow, and unless a cow in her prime could give 6,000 pounds of milk or 300 pounds of butter she was disposed of, regardless of other good qualities, and a cow's standing in the stable was not secure unless she could give in her prime, under favorable conditions, 7,000 pounds of milk or 350 pounds of butter in a year. The herd is made as uniform in size, color and style as possible, that they may present a fine appearance either when standing in the stable or moving along the road to pasture. The following is the general makeup required:

Size.—About 1,000 pounds at maturity, this size having been found to give the best results in this locality and being of sufficient size to please buyers either for breeding or to sell in Brighton as milk cows.

Color.—Dark red with clear white patches, about one-fourth to one-third white being preferred. This gives a wonderfully attractive and lively look to a herd of cows grouped or moving. Then, too, I have thought cows of this color were tougher and gave yellower milk and butter.

Style.—Small head and horns, slim neck, straight back, sharp shoulders, wide on the loin; large, shapely hind quarters; long, slim tail; udder extending well forward and back, well up, under belly; teats long, of equal length, well spread; large milk veins.

Disposition.—Quiet and pleasant.

Rev. Dr. Linscott's Suggestive Questions on the Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 3rd, 1909.

The Beginning of the Christian Church.—Acts ii 22-47.

Golden Text.—They continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayer.—Acts ii: 42.

Verse 22.—How is it that Jesus has impressed himself upon the world as no other man has ever done, and that he has swayed the hearts of the lowly and the mighty alike, and that his influence is increasing with the years?

Verse 23-26.—God clearly sent Jesus with a love message, which he meant them to accept, but which the Jews rejected; and more, for they "with wicked hands crucified and slew" him. Now is it not true that God then adopted his secondary plan of bringing about, by the death of Jesus, what he desired to do by his life?

If God did not want the Jews to reject and crucify Jesus, but to accept him, what would have been the result if they had carried out God's first plan?

Is not the crucifixion of Jesus the colossal crime of history, and is it not the one great example of how God turns evil into good account?

Verse 37.—What was it that had brought this sharp sense of guilt upon them?

What are the influences which put men under conviction; that is, reveal themselves to themselves?

If a person were to ask you, what he should do to be saved, what would you answer him?

Verse 28.—What is it to repent, in the sense here meant?

Can a person be saved, if he intends to sin again?

If a person is sorry enough to forsake his sins, and turns to God to serve him the best he knows, is that true repentance?

Can a Christian retain the favor of God, if he ever plans to sin again?

Do all who by the grace of God forsake their sins, have their past sins forgiven?

Verse 39.—Is the gift of the Holy Spirit for all who are saved?

Have you received the gift of the Holy Spirit; and, if not, why not?

Are all the children of sinners, as well as of saints, promised the salvation of Jesus?

Are there any so far off, or so low down, that God does not bid them to receive the Holy Spirit?

How many does God call to accept of his salvation?

Verse 40.—Are some people saved through persistent exhortation, who never would be saved otherwise?

Verse 41.—Why are not similar revivals to this more often witnessed?
