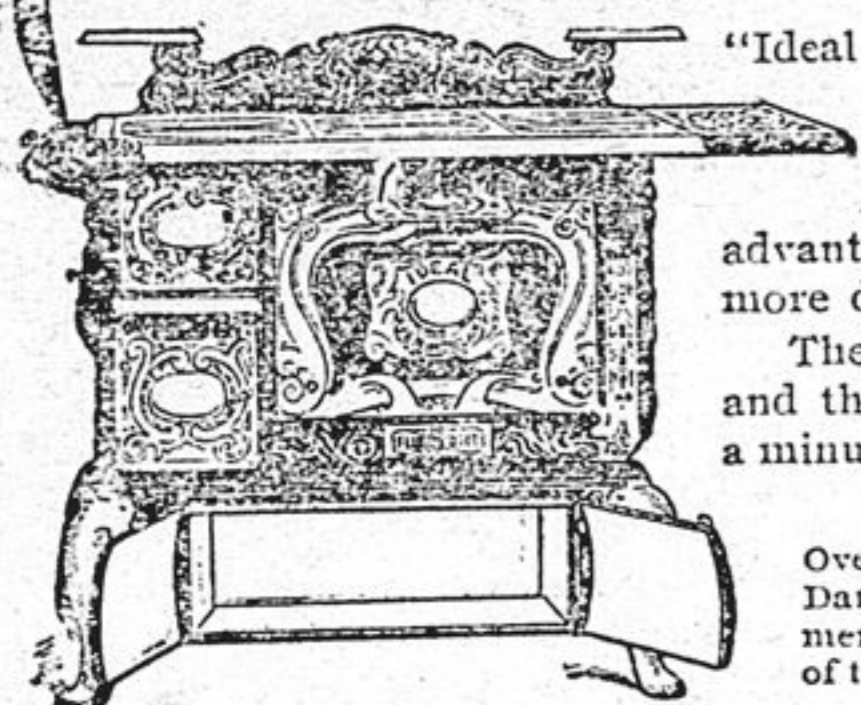

The above is the list of nominees at the meeting held last Tuesday to select candidates to fill the two vacancies in the council resulting from nominees at the regular meeting failing to qualify. Of the eight nominated on Tuesday, four—Messrs. McFarland, Sims, Kearns, and Nevison—qualified and are in the field, and on Tuesday the electors will have the opportunity of making a choice.

At the nomination, Dr. Sims said that since the previous nominations he had found that he seemed to be blamed for everything the council did that anybody disapproved of, justifiably or not; and stated that he had nothing more to do than any other member of the council with anything that was done, good or bad. With regard to the cement walk, he said it was put on Oak street because that was the easiest place to begin; and the oak tree that was cut down was not destroyed wantonly, but because, after considering the matter, it was thought that leaving the tree where it was would necessitate unsightly and inconvenient grades.

Dr. Mason and Mr. W. T. Junkin, who also spoke, were inclined to believe that the evident reluctance of good men to fill public offices could be traced to the indiscriminate criticism to which they were subjected, even when such criticism is most undeserved. Dr. Sims regretted the tendency to confine the airing of complaints to private conversation, and thought it would be better if they were brought forward where and when they could be answered.

The importance of selecting the best men available to serve the town during the coming term was emphasized, as its affairs will need careful handling.

St. Andrew's Church.

Large and enthusiastic was the annual meeting of St. Andrew's church held in the lecture room on Tuesday evening. The financial statement submitted by the treasurer, Mr. Finlay Macdougall, was the best in the history of the congregation. The amounts received for congregational benevolent and missionary purposes were the largest in eighteen years. All the reports, namely, from the Ladies Aid, W. F. M. S., Sabbath School and Guild were most encouraging, indicating progress in every department.

Mr. F. Macdougall, who for the past eighteen years, has so ably and efficiently managed the business of the church, was tendered a hearty vote of thanks, which was responded to in a few well chosen words by Mr. Macdougall. As he has signified his intention of leaving the village, Mr. J. S. Northey was appointed Treasurer. The Board of Managers will consist of Messrs. J. H. Brandon, H. A. McIntosh, Jos. Moynes, Wm. Hetherington, Geo. Imrey, W. L. Robson, W. H. Robson, Dr. Mason, John Northey, with Ed. Fitzgerald as Secretary. A vote of thanks was also tendered Mr. A. Sutherland and the several teachers for the able and untiring way in which they have taken charge of the Sabbath school. As Mrs. Macdougall, greatly to the regret of the congregation, has resigned her position as organist, Miss S. S. Martin was appointed to that position. After congratulatory speeches were made by some of the gentlemen on the splendid progress of the church during the past year, all joined most heartily in singing "Praise God from whom all blessings flow."
