The National Missionary Congress to be held by the churches of Canada under the leadership of the Laymen's Movement, is described as "unique, broad, far-reaching and epoch-marking." It is the first time in history that men of a nation have met to consider and adopt a Missionary Policy for their country.

The theme for the Congress as a whole is Canada's National Missionary Policy, Home and Foreign, and the meetings will be devoted to such topics as "The Relation of the Ministry to the Missionary Church," "The Victorious Problem of Missions," "The Awakening Orient." "The Place of the Church in the Making of the Nation," "The Christianization of Our Civilization," "The Stewardship of Life," and such practical questions as "How to Lead the Church to its Highest Missionary Efficiency."

The Congress will assemble in Massey Hall, Toronto, Wednesday, March 31st, and will not conclude its sessions until Saturday, April 4th.

Speakers of international reputation will present different subjects, and among those whe have already promised to come are: -- Mr. Robert E. Speer, of New York; Bishop Thoburn, of India; Dr. Zwemer; of Arabia; Mr. Silas McBee, of New York, editor The Churchman; Mr . Campbell White, of New York, and Hon. S. B. Capen, of Boston, Secretary and Chairman of the Laymen's International Missionary Movement. One of the interesting speakers at the congress: is to be Mr. D. F.
