#### Village Council.

Fenelon Falls, March 8th, 1909. Council met at regular meeting, and all the members were present. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The auditors' report was laid upon the table.

Sims—Corbett.—That the auditors' report of the village of Fenelon Falls, the Board of Water, Light and Power Commissioners and the Cemetery, be accepted, that the auditors be paid \$70 (\$10 of it from the cemetery fund) for their services, and that the clerk be instructed to have one hundred copies printed for distribution.—Carried.

Mr. Corbett gives notice of a by-law to be introduced at this meeting to extend the time for the return of the collector's roll.

The by-law was introduced, read three times without amendment, and passed.

#### Fire.

Shortly after 7 o'clock on the evening of Thursday, the 4th inst., what might have proved a serious fire broke out in the frame building between Mr. C. Curtis's brick store and Mr. McKillen's shoe shop, on Colborne street. The building was some time ago occupied by Mr. H. Pearce, and lately by Mr. Salem Shakra, who moved out a couple of weeks ago. Fortunately the fire was seen before it had obtained much headway, and the crowd attempted to put it out with snow; but, as there was a strong north-west blowing, the flames got beyond their control. There was some difficulty with the hose; but when this was overcome, and a good stream of water was playing on the blaze, it was extinguished after a short struggle. Mr. Wilson, who had nearly completed fitting up the south half of the ground floor of the building as a barber's shop, will lose only lightly, as most of his stuff was got out. The building, which was considerably damaged, is owned by Mrs. John Chambers, of the Falls, and was insured.

The cause of the fire is unknown. With the strong wind that was blowing, the fire might have taken a number of the buildings on Francis street east, if it had not been seen when it was, or had occurred later in the night. It will serve as a warning to keep the fire-fighting apparatus in good working order, and always ready for use at a moment's notice.

#### Where is Marshal Burley?

Chief of Police Vincent has received a communication from Sarah Rush, of Rednersville, inquiring after her uncle, Marshal Burley or Burleigh, whom she claims formerly lived in Lindsay. His brother, Samuel, lived for a time in Los Angeles, Cal. Any information bearing on this matter can be left with Chief Vincent—Post.

Marshal Burley, probably the man for whom inquiry is being made, lived at the Falls, for some years. Three or four years ago his relatives in California wished him to go there, and offered him inducements. It is stated on good authority here that he was afterwards seen in California by another resident of the Falls.
