**ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH.**—Mr. Lord will continue his sermons on "Last Things" next Sabbath. Evening subject, "Hell," in the light of modern scholarship. Morning subject, "The Kind of Revival We Need."

**VALUABLE COIT LOST.**—Mr. F. C. Johnstone had the misfortune to lose one of a fine pair of colts on Sunday. Distemper was the cause. The animal was a yearling standard bred Keswick, and gave promise of developing exceptional speed.

**SUCCESSFUL SALE.**—A large crowd attended the first of the monthly auctions at the Aldous' Repository on Tuesday, and the sale was very successful, although the rain interfered somewhat. It is the intention of the management to hold one of these sales each month.

**VESTRY MEETING.**—The annual vestry meeting of St. James's church was held on Monday evening. The report of Mr. R. M. Hamilton, warden, and of the ladies' societies in connection with the church, were very satisfactory. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the ladies and the choir for their assistance during the year. Miss Hand, the organist, was granted \$25 in recognition of her services. Mr. Hamilton was re-elected people's warden, and Mr. Edward English was appointed by the Rector, Rev. W. H. A. French, as his warden. Messrs. J. J. Nevison and C. W. Burgoyne were appointed lay delegates to the synod.

**CONVICTION OF PERJURY.**—Mr. E. W. Gaspell, of Fenelon Falls, was convicted of perjury at the County Court held at Lindsay last week, and on Saturday was sentenced to three months in the county jail. It appears that in taking proceedings for libel against the Lindsay Free Press last fall, Mr. Gaspell swore that he owned property which inquiry by the Free Press people went to show he did not own. It is generally thought, however, that Mr. Gaspell was under the impression that the property belonged to him; and in consideration of this, and the representations of many of Mr. Gaspell's acquaintances, Judge Harding made the sentence as light as possible.

**ENTERTAINMENT.**—The annual entertainment in connection with St. Andrew's Sunday school will be held in Dickson's hall, on the evening of Wednesday, April 23<sup>rd</sup>. The fairy extravaganza, "While Mortals Sleep," an operetta in two acts, will be presented by 58 children and young people in fancy costumes. Also, "The Professor's Round-Up," an interesting, amusing and attractive play, varied in a pleasing manner by musical selections by sixteen young ladies and gentlemen in costume. The meetings are considered to be perhaps the most effective in the history of the congregation and many members were added to the church.

The great Layman's Missionary meeting lately held in Toronto was fraught with feelings of buoyant expectations. All civilized nations will wish the movement unbounded success. Everything that tends to the uplifting of humanity will be welcomed by those of a secular as well as those of a religious turn of mind. In this quiet little village of Fenelon Falls, with all our opportunities, we might be looked upon as fairly moral and religious people, and with our advantages we are naturally expected to set a good example. Our village by-laws and our statutory laws are fairly well observed, but there are exceptions to every rule, and one thing I wish to direct your attention to is this—that temptation should be removed from the very young of the village and make it hard for them to go wrong. One thing I particularly refer to is that people of religious training and pretensions should not allow a slot machine to remain on the street on Sundays to entice the little ones to spend their coppers, which are intended for Sunday school—in fact, to do mercantile business amongst the boys with a slot machine and be so much the richer on the following Monday morning. Now, my honest belief is that this thing should be stopped at once, and that a missionary movement along these lines is urgently needed right here in Fenelon Falls.

Rev. Dr. Linscott's Suggestive Question on the Sunday School Lesson for April 18th, 1909

The Conversion of Saul.—Acts ix : 1-20.

Golden Text—He fell to the earth and heard a voice saying unto him, Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me? Acts ix : 4.

Verses 1-2—From experience, philosophically, theologically, psychologically, or any other way, how do you account for the bitter hatred of Saul for Christians?

After his conversion, did he show the same hatred toward those who opposed Christianity?

Does history justify the statement that zealous religionists, who have not known, nor experienced the love of God, have been exceedingly cruel and bitter men?

Verses 3-4—What was the nature of the light that shined around Saul? (See Acts xii : 6, xxvi : 13, I Cor. xv : 8.) Whose voice was it that Saul heard?

What reason is there to believe that this was a real voice with outward sound?

Is there any sinner so bad that Jesus does not call him to repent?

Had Saul actually been persecuting Jesus? (See Matt. 25-40.)

If we hurt or help a Christian, is that actually done to Jesus?

Is there a sense in which a Christian is the actual Christ?

Verses 5—Did Saul know from the first who it was that spoke to him?

Does it always consciously hurt to fight against God?

Does wrong doing always hurt whether done in ignorance or not?

Verses 6—What makes sinners always tremble when God reproves them for their sins?

At what stage does God forgive a convicted sinner?

When was Saul actually converted?

Why did not Jesus tell Saul there and then, what he wanted him to do?

Verses 7—Why does the supernatural always frighten people?

Verses 8-9—What had blinded Saul?

How did Saul spend the days that he was without sight?

Did he fast because he had no desire for food, or was it a religious fast?

Is fasting of any use in these days as a help to spiritual life?

Verses 10-12—May the ability to hear God speak, be acquired by all true Christians?

Have you any experience of God-telling more than one person the same thing, so that when they came to compare experiences, God's message was confirmed?

Will God always prepare us for our work, and prepare the work for us?

Verses 13-16—Is God pleased, or displeased, if we do not accept what he says, when it is not clear to us?

Verses 17-18—Did Saul at this time receive the Holy Ghost, or at the time of his conversion, and when do Christians generally receive him? (This question must be answered in writing by members of the club.)

Verses 19-22—Do all genuine converts, like Saul, commence immediately to get others converted?

What was the power in Saul which gave him his great zeal, and is the same power available for every Christian?

Verses 23-25—If a person feels, or acts, in a bitter spirit toward one of a different faith, is that proof that he is not in touch with the true God?

Verses 26-30—Are Christians justified in being cautious in receiving strangers?

What is the best way for a young convert to show he really is a Christian?

Is a true earnest aggressive Christian as liable to give offense in these days as was Saul?


